QUIET IN SCANDINAVIA.

Sweden Has Hopes of Regaining

Finnish Provinces. Copenhagen, Aug. 19 .- The situation in the Scandinavian peninsular is quiet and there is mutual determination, for the present, to maintain neutrality. The entente between Norway and Sweden is considered an effective bar against attack. There is, however, a strong belief in Sweden that 'an opportunity may come, with the territorial re-adjustments after the war for Sweden to regain her former Finnish provinces. The latest German newspapers received here, carrying appeals for sub scriptions for the maintenance of families bereft of their bread win-

ners by the war. These papers show also that various German municipalities are spending large sums of money in the purchase of food and in providing work for the unemployed. Nearly all the German trade nions are giving up one-fourth their subscriptions for the penefit of
