Latons of Toronto, have discovered a method to take advantage of the twenty-mile zone in the delivery of their parcels. On Monday they shipped by freight to Kingston, three tons and a half of their fall catalogues for distribution in this district. They were mailed in Kingston and, therefore able to secure a much lower postage rate. The twenty-mile zone, was instituted to protect and facilitate the handling of merchants' goods in their own vicinity. If what the Eaton firm did on Monday becomes a common practice the big departmental stores will have a decided advantage over the small, retail stores, depriving them of a lot of business. The local merchants have decided to take the matter up and will see if it is not possible to better protect their interests, as was the intention of the parcel post act. The will of Baron Der Schlichting, one of the notable Russian residents of Paris, who died recently, leaves his magnificent collection of paintings, bronzes and sculptures, valued at \$20,000,000, to the Louvre. The Cunard line Aquitania, now in the government service, anchored Monday evening at the Macey bar with her bows damaged, according to Lloyd's despatches from Liverpool. In addition to the purse's safe, divers have succeeded in raising \$250,000 in silver bullion from the hull of the sunken steamship Empress of Ireland.
