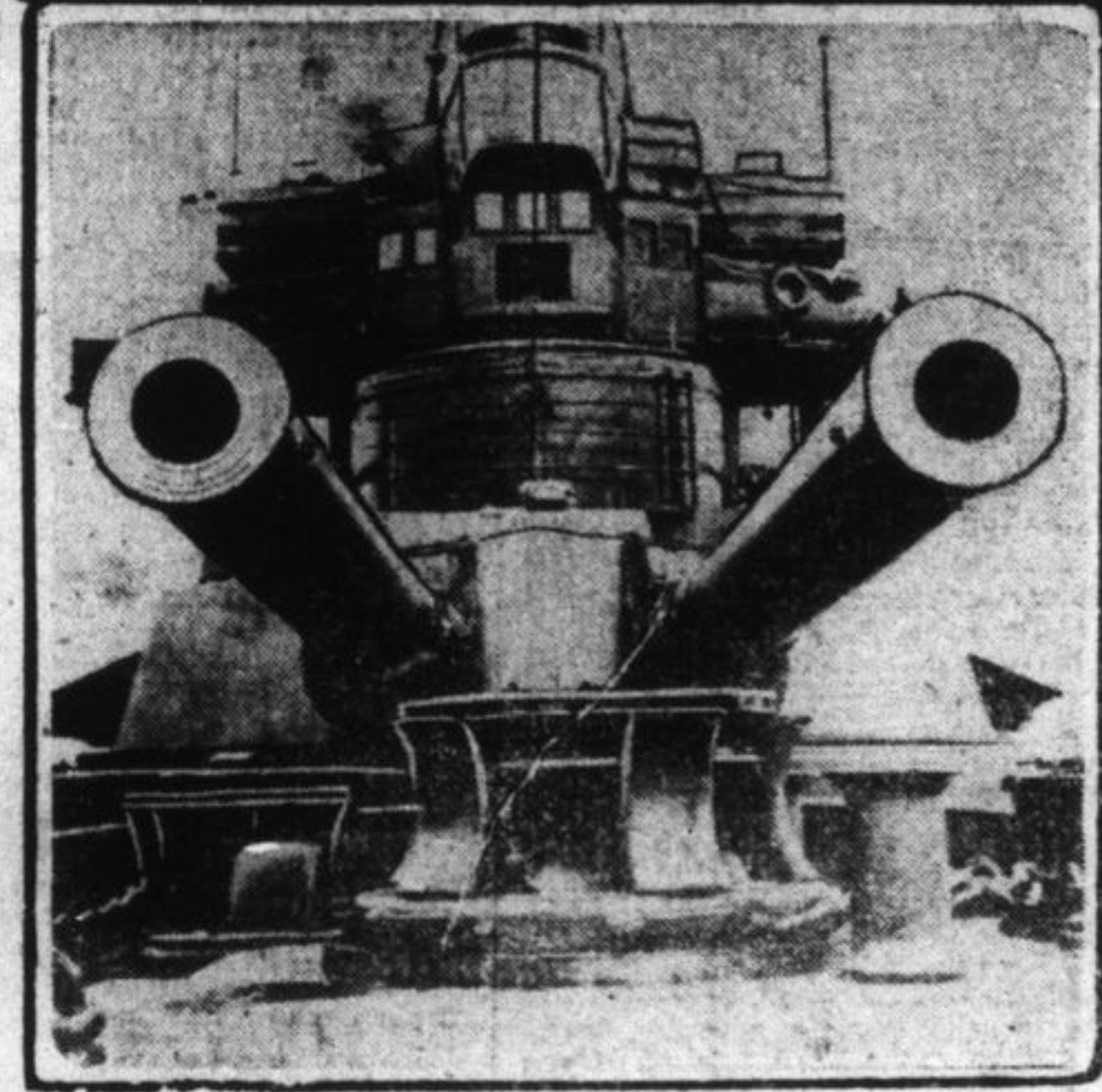
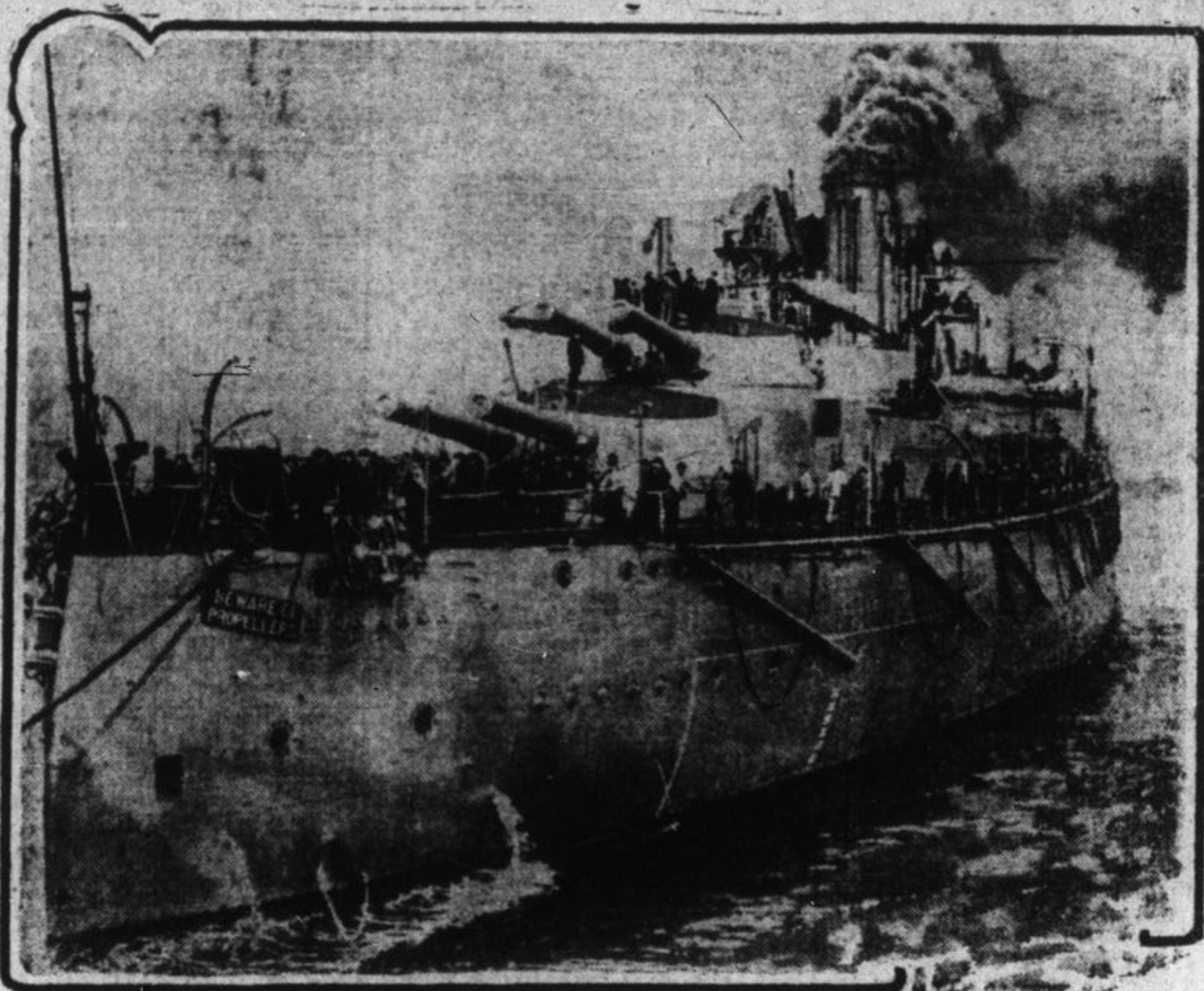
Westport News.
