FOR PATRIOTIC FUND

COMMITTEE HELD ITS FIRST MEETING THURSDAY NIGHT.

The Relief of Families Will be According To the Necessities in Each Case — Grant From Council Is for Purely Patriotic Purposes.

A meeting of the committee appointed by the city council to act in connection with the Kingston Patriotic and Relief Fund was held Thursday evening in Mayor Shaw's office at the city hall. The mayor occupied the chair and there were present, besides him, Ald. Harrison, J. A. Minnes, W. R. Givens, C. A. Macpherson and R. Meek.

The mayor proceeded to state the object of the meeting and the present decided that the fund to be raised would be for the benefit of the homes and families or dependent ones of men who had gone into active service from Kingston. This service included those who are doing duty at various points about the city, and representing the city's volunteer corps. It was decided that the relief of the families would be according to the necessities of each case, and it was announced that the \$5,000 given by the city council was for purely patriotic purposes.

It was intimated that the county had been invited to co-operate with the city with regard to this movement, but as the special committee looked at the matter, and realized the magnitude of the task before them, it was decided that the warden of the county should be communicated with and that he should be advised to get the county council and county people interested in this matter. In this way they would be able to conduct a separate organization for the relief of those who were left in the county by departing soldiers and dependent upon the county for care and relief.

It was decided that help would only be extended to families according to their needs, and living within the city, so far as the Kingston committee and the Kingston Patriotic and Relief fund are concerned. All disbursements to be made under the authority of the special committee appointed by the council. It will remain in office for executive purposes during the continuance of the patriotic movement. The city treasurer will receive all funds and pay all accounts when duly certified.

OFF TO VALCARTIER

FIFTH FIELD BATTERY LEFT ON FRIDAY AFTERNOON.

Band of 14th Regiment Played Them To the G. T. R. Station and Large Crowd of Citizens Assembled to Give Them Send-Off—More Horses Are Needed.

The 5th field battery under the command of Major E. C. Barrett left for Valcartier on Friday afternoon. The train carrying the volunteers pulled out of the Grand Trunk inner station shortly after four o'clock, and proceeded to Gananoque, where the battery was joined by the 8th field battery, in command of Major Russell Britton. A large number of citizens were at the station to cheer the boys off to the scene of mobilization. The batteries will go as far as Montreal by G. T. R., and will then transfer to the Canadian Northern railroad.

A number of the ladies of the city were at the train and gave each of the men three lunches for the journey. The ladies, under the direction of Mrs. E. H. Pense, have been busy for some days, canvassing their friends for the purpose of preparing the lunches. As the men will be on the train for at least twenty-four hours the lunches will be very much appreciated. The men extend thanks to the ladies for their kindness.

The work of organizing the battery has been no light task. For some time the officers have been very busy taking on recruits. A great deal of difficulty was experienced in getting men on account of the wives of the married men refusing to give permission to the men to leave the city.

A number of the men who are attached to the battery came from Brockville and Belleville. Some difficulty has been experienced in purchasing enough horses. Although Major Barrett has been purchasing horses for the past week he has been unable to get enough and will make purchases for some time. He will go as far as Valcartier but will immediately return to the city for the purpose of getting horses.
