**GO OUTSIDE FOR GOODS.**

While They Can Be Purchased For Same Price Here.

It is doubtful if the local merchants can make an effective stand against the habit of departmental stores in the larger cities freight-truck parcels to the city and have them posted here to take advantage of the cheaper rate in the twenty-mile zone. One merchant, in discussing the situation, said that he would not expect any of the trade if he could not equal the prices of the larger stores. They have an immense overhead expense, paying higher rents, taxes, etc. They buy in large quantities but this does not make a big enough difference to allow them to sell cheaper than the smaller stores in the smaller cities. If people would bring the catalogue to his store he is confident that he can equal or sell at a cheaper price the goods advertised. People are misled by the attractive cuts and reading matter in the catalogue, and do not realize that the local merchants can sell them the goods just as cheap.

**The Work Completed.**

The men engaged in laying the stones between the tracks on Princess street completed the work on Friday afternoon. The pavement from Clergy to Ontario streets will be open to traffic about the first of the week. It is not known when the street cars will be running on the double track. H. C. Nickle, superintendent of the railroad company, says the cars could run on the double track at once providing the city did not decide to pave Princess street, from Clergy to Barrie streets.

**DEATH OF YOUNG KINGSTONIAN**  
Edward L. Goodwin Passed Away at Sudbury.

On Thursday afternoon, in the Sudbury general hospital, the sad death occurred of Edward Leigh Goodwin, B.Sc., aged twenty-four years, son of W. L. Goodwin, dean of Queen's School of Mining.
