BRITISH BOY SCOUTS

Are Doing Good Work, Major G. H. Gillespie Says.

While in England, Major George Gillespie, organizer of cadet corps for the 2nd division, had a grand opportunity to see the Boy Scouts on active service.

As soon as war was declared the Boy Scouts came to the front, and offered their services for home duty.
