**MORE GERMAN SPIES**

**HAVE BEEN LANDED IN OLD FORT HENRY.**

German Officer on Parole Is Back Again—Another Spy Was Caught At Morrisburg.

One of the most dangerous German suspects rounded up by the military authorities, was captured at Morrisburg on Sunday evening and is now in safekeeping in Fort Henry. On Monday night one non-commissioned officer and men from Stormont and Glengarry regiment arrived in the city with the prisoner.

On Sunday evening when the man was placed under arrest by Capt. Ferguson, it was discovered that he had considerable goods in his possession. There appears to be no doubt but that he is a spy as he had map of Petawawa camp and the surrounding district in his possession.

He is able to speak three or four languages and also understands the military codes. The man who is forty-eight years of age, was attempting to cross into the American border when tipped by the guard.

German Broke His Parole. J. H. Berger, the ex-German officer, who has been out on parole from Fort Henry for the past two weeks got into trouble again, and is now back at the fort.

**BRITISH SUBMARINE SINKS GERMAN CRUISER**

Official German Report Gives Few Details of Battle—Most of the Crew Saved.

Rome, Sept. 15.—An official report from Berlin states that a British submarine, on Sunday, sank the German cruiser Hela. A majority of the crew were rescued. It is not announced where the vessel was sunk, but it may be a confirmation of the report of last week that a British submarine ran into the harbor at Wilhelmshaven, fired two torpedoes toward the vessels in the harbor and then plunged underneath the surface, to remain there in hiding for several hours while the German warships searched for her. She later made her escape.

The Hela ranks as a small protected cruiser, having a displacement of 2,040 tons, and a complement of 178. She was 328 feet long, with a beam of thirty-six feet. She was built by Weser, of Berlin, and was laid down in 1902 and finished in 1906. In 1910 the Hela was refitted.

**Watching For the Tug.**

The marine men are watching for the big tug, purchased by the Russian government at Fort William, to pass down the lake on her way to Montreal and then across the Atlantic ocean. Although no information is given out, it is believed that the tug has been purchased for the purpose of breaking ice at the Russian White Sea port at Archangel, which is now of incalculable value because the Germans at Kehl dominate the naval situation in the Baltic.

**A CRIMEAN VETERAN DEAD.**

Late Thomas Packer, an Old Kingston Resident.

An old resident of Kingston and a veteran of the Crimean war, passed away at the residence of his daughter, Mrs. Amy Connor, 134 Division street, on Monday morning, in the person of Thomas Packer. The deceased was born at Cirencester, Gloucestershire, England, eighty-five years ago, and when sixteen years of age he came to Canada with the Royal Horse Artillery. After a couple of years spent in this country at New London, his brigade was called to take an active part in the Crimean war, from which campaign he survived to tell the tale of many hair-breadth escapes which confronted him.

On one occasion, while fatigued, he slept out of his tent, while another soldier was allowed to take his place. During the course of that night a shell struck the tent and killed the soldier sleeping in his bed as well as others. Upon another occasion in this campaign he was sighting a gun and had only taken his head away from the weapon ready to fire it off, when a shot put the cannon he had been sighting out of commission. The third adventure in the campaign was during a heavy bombardment when every man besides himself was killed out of his whole battery. An officer coming along inquired what was the reason his outfit was not replying to the enemy's fire, but when he saw that Mr. Packer was the sole survivor, he urged him to collect others to get a gun into action. This he did by going to the magazine and securing the two men who were used for passing out the explosives. The late Mr. Packer received a medal from this campaign and also another for long service and good conduct.

The deceased was an Anglican in religion and a member of St. James' church. To mention his loss there are Thomas Packer, of Toronto; Alfred Packer, of this city; Emily Packer, of Kingston; Mrs. C. P. Eby, of Chicago; Mrs. Amy Connor, of Kingston, all of whom are sons and daughters of the deceased. A sister, Miss Elizabeth Packer, resides at the old family residence in England. A niece, Miss Florence Sunley, of Toronto, came out from the old country last October. Active service was also seen by the late Mr. Packer in Malta and the Ionian Islands, and after an extensive military career he was retired on a pension.

The funeral of the deceased will be held on Wednesday morning, at ten o'clock, to St. James' church, where Rev. T. W. Swayze will officiate. The remains will then be buried in Cataract cemetery. At one time the late Mr. Packer was president of St. James' Temperance Society.
