A SHOT GUN TRAGEDY A THOUSAND OFFICERS CANNOT GO TO WAR

MARK HILL KILLED WHILE OUT DUCK SHOOTING

In a Rowboat at Seeley's Bay—He Grabbed the Gun by the Muzzle and the Trigger Caught the Seat.

A tragedy occurred at Seeley's Bay at nine o'clock on Tuesday morning while two young men were out in a boat duck shooting. One of the men, Mark Hill, aged twenty years, while picking up his shot gun was killed instantly, having the back of his head broken off.

The accident was entirely due to carelessness on the part of Hill because his companion stated at the inquest that when he was endeavoring to get his gun in haste, he caught hold of it by the muzzle. The trigger which was pointing downward when he began to pull the gun along the bottom of the skiff, caught upon one of the seats and the discharge followed. His companion rowed with all his might to shore and summoned help. Drs. F. Young and W. Darcy were brought to the scene but nothing could be done as life was extinct. Some time before they arrived.

An inquest was held the same morning, and the developments showed that the shooting was purely accidental.

The funeral of the late Mr. Hill will be held at 1.30 o'clock on Thursday afternoon. The deceased was a son of Mr. and Mrs. John Hill of Seeley's Bay.

LADY IN AN AUTO

Ran Into Cart Horse, Upsetting the Animal.

A lady automobile driver caused an accident to a cart horse when about 11.30 o'clock on Wednesday morning, by losing control of her car at the corner of Wellington and Johnson streets. She was driving up the corner of Wellington toward the park but seeing the cart's horse coming toward her turned the car to her right too sharply, and the front wheels went up on the sidewalk. She then sharply turned the wheels to the left to come off the sidewalk. The horse turned in her direction and the car ran squarely into the animal. The horse fell and by the time the lady stopped her car the bumper bar in the front was across the horse's neck.

The cart driver told her to back the car up and to do this it was necessary to start the engine, which badly frightened the animal, and it kicked in all directions, breaking the harness and the shafts.

The engine was stopped and the car was pushed out of the way by men in the crowd that gathered. The horse received some bruises.

YOUNG-DICK WEDDING.

Solemnized at the Home of the Bride's Parents.

A quiet wedding was solemnized at the home of Mr. and Mrs. David J. Dick, 67 Nelson street, at nine o'clock on Tuesday night, when their eldest daughter, Isabella McNeill Dick, was united in marriage to Gail McCurdy Young, of Danville, N. Y. Rev. Dr. Malcolm Macgillivray, of Chalmers church, performed the ceremony. Only the immediate relatives of both contracting parties were present. The couple were unattended.

After the ceremony the guests repaired to the dining room where a sumptuous repast was served. The newly-weds went aboard the 2.48 G. T.R. train to proceed to New York city, by way of Montreal. They will reside in Danville, N.Y.

BAIL AGAIN REFUSED.

To Dr. C. K. Robinson, Over Blanche Yorke Case.

A Toronto despatch says: In Justice Latchford's private room at Osgoode Hall Wednesday afternoon T. C. Robinette, K. C., asked for a bail order on behalf of his client, Dr. C. K. Robinson, committed for trial on a murder charge, arising from the death of Miss Blanche Yorke, at Tamworth. Edward Bayly, K. C., appeared for the attorney general.

His lordship refused the application but Mr. Robinette will move again in the assizes at Nanapanee. The sitting will open on Tuesday of next week.

Ducks Not Plentiful.

The ducks this season are very few and far between, is the story of the disappointed sportsmen who returned from the opening day's hunting on Tuesday. Illegal shooting before the open season is a common enough occurrence, but men who were in the feeding places of the ducks say a month ago they were plentiful. Another explanation given is that owing to the warm weather this year the birds have not commenced to fly. Anyway there was any amount of hunting, but very little shooting on Tuesday.

Awaiting the Fair.

The arrangements for "Kingston's Only Fair" are about completed and if the officials are supplied good weather the most successful fair that has ever been held in Kingston will be the result.

The entries for the trials of speeds are very good, and closely contested races are expected.

County horsemen are taking great interest. Mr. Bushell has worked hard to make the biggest county fair that has ever been held here and a record crowd is expected.

These Chosen Will Have Passed the Highest Examinations at Valcartier.

Ottawa, Sept. 16.—One thousand officers, now at Valcartier, will be unable to accompany the Canadian overseas contingent to the front, when Canada's first army division sets sail for the scene of hostilities, unless they enlist as privates. There are seventeen hundred officers in the camp and not more than seven hundred are needed. The choice is made on the showing of the officers at the examinations now being held.

PITH OF THE NEWS.

Presented in the Briefest Possible Form.

Montreal patriotic fund is now \$613,255.

That St. John, N. B., is to be strongly fortified is the report current.

The departure of the Canadian force for the fields of war seems close at hand.

The department of agriculture (fruit branch) is taking steps to stimulate the industry of fruit evaporation.

Colonel Von Reuter, widely known through the part he played in the Zuber affair, was recently killed in action.

Among gifts to Montreal's patriotic fund were subscriptions by three Germans, "British at heart," amounting to \$6,000.

Vancouver citizens' war fund reached almost \$30,000 in the first day, independently of the Board of Trade and mayor's fund.

A few showers have occurred in the west, chiefly in Manitoba, but otherwise the weather in Canada has been very fine for the past few days.

A by-law to grant a franchise for twenty years to the Cornwall street railway light and power company will be voted on by the rate payers on Oct. 14th.

James Bailey, for thirty-five years marine superintendent of the Canadian and Thomson Lines, and a former member of the Queen's Own, Toronto, died at Montreal.

The hundred Red Cross nurses to go to the front will be selected from among the six hundred applicants, forty who have had war experience being all accepted.

Union Bank of Canada at Winnipeg has made a contribution to the National Patriotic fund of \$25,000. Not a single contract has been let by the railways and canals department since the war began.

The London Board of Trade is arranging the insurance of cargoes carried by Belgian steamers, and approved by the Belgian government, under the same conditions and rates of insurance as British vessels.

General Charles Roques, was killed by being struck in the head by a bullet near Bar-La-Duc. He had just been promoted on the field to be a general of division when he was killed.

YOUNG MEN IN TROUBLE.

Young Girl Made Serious Charge Against One of Them.

That he forced his way into her home and attempted to assault her, was the charge of a sixteen-year-old girl made in the police court on Wednesday morning against William Bryant, a young man. She also charged that a brother, Henry Bryant, also forced his way into the house and after attacking her small brother and putting him out of the house, assaulted her father, who appeared on the scene.

After the hearing of the evidence, which required a couple of hours, the magistrate sent William Bryant to jail for one month and imposed a fine of \$10 and costs on the brother. D. A. Givens conducted the prosecution and P. J. Rigney was counsel for the two young men.

The two had been drinking, and this was the charge the police had against them. The other charge was placed against them by the girl. The affair occurred about 4.30 o'clock on Tuesday afternoon.

Opposed to Revising Schedule.

John Dawson, secretary of Queen's Athletic association, when speaking to the Whig stated that he was not in favor of the revising of the senior intercollegiate rugby schedule as suggested by McGill. The dropping out of the R. M. C. team means that Queen's will have the first bye. If the schedule is changed, it means that if R. M. C. wants to go into the series again next fall, another change will have to be made. Queen's will likely play its first game on October 17th.

Presented With a Gift.

On the occasion of the departure of Rev. Sibbett, organist at St. Mark's church, Barriefield, for Guelph, where he will enter the agricultural college, the members of the choir gathered at the home of the rector, Rev. Alfred Cooke, on Monday evening, and presented Mr. Sibbett with a travelling bag. Rev. Alfred Cooke read the address, while W. Milton made the presentation.

Killed At Valcartier.

Toronto, Sept. 16.—A despatch received here says that John Stephenson was killed by a railway train at Valcartier camp. He was without uniform and had enlisted in one of the Ontario regiments, but which one is not specified. Toronto papers say he enlisted in Toronto.
