ENGLISH AND GERMAN CAVALRY DUEL WITH SWORDS IN FRANCE. From a drawing by Philip Dau I, who made his picture for the story told a correspondent by a British huzzar: "We ran plump on a party of the German 4th cuirassiers round a corner of a little village. Absolute surprise for both of us. Before you could wink we were flying at one another as hard as the horses could go, and the villagers were yelling and scrambling into the houses on either side of the road. There was no firing, it was absolutely a proper cavalry charge, like you see in the pictures - horses going hell-for-leather and every man sitting hunched up under the No. 1 guard and hoping he wouldn't get his knees crushed by the fellows on each side of him. Lighter though they were, the Hussars went at a pace that more than compensated for their inferior weight. The cuirassiers in full stride and on fresh horses might have ridden over us, but, slower at the 'take off' and, as was subsequently proved, mounted on horses already ridden to death, they were taken at a tremendous disadvantage. Twenty-seven of them were killed and twelve were taken prisoners."


