YOUNG MAN FELL INTO SLIP FRIDAY AFTERNOON.

Was Pulled Out In The Nick of Time and Recovered at General Hospital—Pulmotor Not Needed.

A young man who gave the name of McLeod, had a very narrow escape from drowning on Friday afternoon about four o'clock, when he fell into the Montreal Transportation company's slip. Some workmen came to his rescue and pulled him out, and after Capt. Frederick Reid and fireman from the Ontario street station worked over him for a time he came around all right, but he had a close call. Later he was removed to the General hospital in James Reid's ambulance where he recovered. Constables Naylor and Craig were also on the scene shortly after the accident occurred, and rendered aid.

A call was sent for the pulmotor and it was hurried to the scene, but was not required.
