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
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

Mr. Holland says that the war has ruined all kinds of business in South America except mining. There are a good many German mercantile houses in Nicaragua, but their business has been killed. The Spaniards and the Indians are death on the Germans, hating them like poison, and Germany trade in that region is a thing of the past.
