## TOSSED BY A TRAIN

### A BULGARIAN WAR VETERAN HAD LEG CRUSHED.

#### Near Rideau Station on Thursday — Brought to the Hotel Dieu — He Received Wounds in the Balkan War.

A Bulgarian, Jelio Jechoff, who is a veteran of the Balkan war, had a narrow escape from being killed near Rideau station on Thursday morning when a G.T.R. way freight going west struck him and tossed him heavily to one side of the track. His right leg was badly crushed and bruised, but it will not be necessary to amputate the member.

The victim was engaged as an employee with the "Grand Trunk" construction gang and while repairing the track near the above place he stepped from the rails when he saw the freight train coming. Unfortunately he did not move far enough and a plank projecting from one of the flat cars struck him with a heavy blow, sending him headlong to the ground. His companions, who were also engaged on the work, rendered what assistance they could, for the injured man was left in a semi-conscious condition. Medical attendance was summoned and Dr. S. Keyes, of Kingston, responded. The foreigner was removed to the Hotel Dieu, where Dr. W. G. Anglin, G.T.R. surgeon, took over the case and dressed the wounds.

Jelio Jechoff is a jovial chap and a veteran of the Balkan war about two years ago. When seen by a Whig reporter he had an interesting story to tell of that campaign and showed the newspaper man's four wounds which he received in the war. One of them resulted in carrying away the top of his first finger on the left hand. Another made a deep gash in the palm of the same member. A large bullet wound was seen in his left shoulder, while another bullet had pierced his right leg a little below the knee. Although Jelio Jechoff had suffered so badly, then he stated to the reporter that he was ready again to take up arms for his country against Germany and whenever the call is made he will be there.

### Worked Herself Off.

Captain John Cherry, of the steamer Holcomb, owned by the Cardinal Starch company, states that the report that his steamer was ashore in the Brockville Narrows and was pulled off by the Donnelly Wrecking company was incorrect.

The captain states that he was lying at anchor at Cole's light on account of the fog. When the fog cleared at 1:30 o'clock in the morning, he pulled up anchor and went down two-thirds the length of the Brockville Narrows. At this point the fog caught him again, and he was forced to throw out his anchor. The boat drifted, and when caught on a ledge or rock, but he pulled her off himself.

### Parole Conditions.

It was learned on Friday that the convicts released from the penitentiary lately are out on parole with the only special condition being that if they leave Canada, with the militia they will not be expected to keep the penitentiary officials informed of their actions, and if they do not go, their parole will not be cancelled. In the latter case they will be expected to report at regular intervals of their actions and work. It was at first reported that certain convicts had been granted their parole on condition that they join the overseas forces.

### Prayers For Peace.

At 12:05 p.m. Friday the first of the "meetings for prayer" under the auspices of the Evangelical Alliance, was held in the city hall. The services were short, lasting only until 12:30 o'clock. They are for the purpose of praying for the divine overruling of the present war, and will last until the war ceases. At the service Friday, Rev. T. W. Savary, of St. James' church, was the leader, and the speaker was Principal Gordon, who gave a short talk on the power of prayer and the extent of the war. "No other war caused so many people to pray for peace," he said.

### Civic Finance Committee

The old question of getting better railway facilities to the industries on Ontario street came before a special meeting of the Civic Finance committee on Friday morning, but no action was taken. It is proposed to have a joint meeting of the Finance committee and Board of Works. The committee had a lengthy discussion over the sale of city debentures.

## WHAT MCGILL WANTS

### In the Way of Re-arranging Rugby Schedule.

Montreal Star. The fact that Royal Military College has dropped out of the Intercollegiate Football Union, will mean that the entire schedule will have to be re-arranged. McGill has contended since the schedule was published last spring that Queen's was not given quite a fair show, but that Toronto had everything at its own way. Since R.M.C. dropped out McGill's home games are October 10th and November 14th, Queen's on October 24th and 31st, and Toronto's games on October 17th and November 7th.

According to an official at McGill, Queen's two home games are too close upon each other, while McGill's are too far apart. He proposes the following re-arrangement: October 10th, McGill at Queen's; October 17th, Queen's at Toronto; October 24th, Toronto at McGill; October 31st, Toronto at Queen's; November 7th, McGill at McGill. It is understood that the above is the schedule McGill will ask for at the Intercollegiate Union meeting at Kingston on Saturday.

Because R.M.C. has dropped out of the Intercollegiate Football Union, McGill University will lose between \$2,500 and \$3,000 in gate receipts this year. This was the statement given out at McGill Union.

Last year these receipts went a long way to pay the McGill students' council out of debt.

### Intercollegiate Rugby Executive.

A meeting of the executive of the Intercollegiate Rugby union has been called for Saturday afternoon in the Victoria gymnasium, when representatives from Varsity, McGill, Queen's and Royal Military college will be present.

The matter of the cadets from the Royal Military college dropping from the union will come before the executive.

It is stated that McGill and Varsity are in favor of revising the schedule. Queen's is against this on the ground that if at any time the cadets want to enter the union it would mean another change in the schedule.

### Touching Love Letter.

In a French Journal in possession of Mr. Klock a love letter found beside a slain Belgian officer on the battlefield of Haelen is reprinted. It reads: Darling—In this war fate has been more cruel to us than to many other nations. If I do not live to create for you the life of happiness we dream of, remember that my only wish now is that you should be happy. Forget me. Make some happy home for yourself that will bring you some of the larger joys of life. As for myself, I shall die joyfully thinking of your love. My last thought is of you. Take this the last kiss, from the man who loves you.
