**R.C.H.A. BAND RETURNS**

**IS IN QUARTERS AT TETE DE PONT BARRACKS.**  
Bade Farewell To the Artillerymen Who Sail For England - A Number of Artillerymen Returned to Kingston.  
The band of the Royal Canadian Horse Artillery, which has been at Valcartier for the past six weeks, returned to the city on Tuesday afternoon and immediately went in quarters at Tete de Pont barracks.  
The trip was made over the Canadian Northern railroad. The men left the camp grounds on Monday evening about ten o'clock and arrived in the city at five o'clock on Tuesday afternoon.  
The men report having a big time at Valcartier. Although the weather has been very cold for the past week the men enjoyed themselves. Before leaving the camp grounds the bandmen bade farewell to the artillerymen who are leaving for overseas service. Although the men left the camp grounds a couple of days ago, it was thought that they would sail Wednesday morning.  
The bandmen state that on Sunday evening it was so cold on the camp grounds that there was about one half-inch of snow lying on the ground.  
Three of the members of the band got their band discharge and sailed with the battery for the front.  
The band was accompanied by about ten or fifteen baggage men who did not sail with the contingent. Some of these men were turned down on account of being medically unfit for service, while others were unable to get the consent of their wives.  
When the men arrived at the barracks they were very hungry on account of only having one meal in over twenty hours.  
Major Hamilton is in command of the men who returned.  
It is the intention of the bandmen to occupy their old quarters to the right of the gate. The quarters to the left of the gate will be occupied by the men of the 44th regiment who will march into the barracks on Wednesday. A fatigue party of the riflemen were busy on Tuesday cleaning up the quarters.

**GRAND OPERA HOUSE.**

The Marks Company Produced "The Bishop's Carriage."  
The Marks Bros. company was greeted with a large audience at the Grand Opera House last evening. The company presented the dramatic production of "The Bishop's Carriage," a story which is quite familiar to the public. Miss A. **STUDENTS HARD HIT**  
BY THROWING UP POSITIONS TO GO TO VALCARTIER.  
A Number Will be Unable to Attend Queen's as They Are Now Short of Money.  
It is feared that some of the science students from Queen's university who have been at Valcartier camp for the past six weeks will be unable to return to Queen's university this fall on account of lack of funds.  
When the students were called out for service they gave up good positions and reported at once at the camp grounds at Valcartier. The giving up of the positions means that the men are short of money, which they had expected to pay for their course at Queen's university. Although they have been paid \$1.10 a day while under canvas, that will not make up for the amount which they have lost.  
A few days ago the militia department at Ottawa was asked if it could see its way clear to station the men at Tete de Pont barracks and allow them to attend the university.  
It is not at all likely that the request will be granted by the department as the barracks will be well filled by the time the 14th regiment and the R. C. H. A. band are in quarters.  
The science students did work at Valcartier camp which only experienced engineers could do.  
Although no word has been received from any of the students the past few days, it is thought that they are at work some place between Valcartier and Quebec, where the troops are boarding the steamers.  
As the road is very rough in places, it has been found necessary to place small bridges across it for the soldiers to pass over.
