A LARGE ATTENDANCE OF STUDENTS EXPECTED AT QUEEN'S UNIVERSITY.

The War Will Not Reduce It Much
Appointments to Science Faculty—Large Numbers of Freshmen.

G. Y. Chow, registrar of Queen's university, stated on Wednesday morning that he did not believe the attendance at the university this fall would be injured to any extent by the war conditions.

On Wednesday morning the classes at the university were commenced and a fair number of the students in attendance. This is the seventy-fourth session of Queen's.

There was a big rush of students at the registrar's office on Tuesday and Wednesday for fee-paying.

It is expected that there will be large attendances in the first years in all the faculties. A large number of "freshettes" have arrived.

It is a difficult matter to say much about the Faculty of Science on account of so many of the students being at Valcartier at the present time. About twenty-five who were in attendance last fall have responded to England's call for men to go to the front, and are at the present time at Quebec. About one hundred students are at Valcartier at the present time, but they will return in the course of a few days. Prof. Lindsay Malcolm and Prof. Henderson are expected any day and will immediately take over their duties at the college.

E. F. Sterne, B. Sc., has been appointed lecturer in Industrial Chemistry to take the place of Prof. L. F. Guttman, who has gone to the front.

Prof. Alexander Macphail is likely to sail with the overseas contingent. No appointment will be made to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Prof. Wilbault.

Percy Wilgar, who has been appointed as professor of civil engineering, the position held by the late Prof. A. K. Kirkpatrick, took over his duties on Wednesday morning.

The Ontario conservatives will hold a caucus in a few days to choose a successor to Premier Whitney.

GALE SWEEP NORTH SEA.

German Air Manoeuvres Are Abandoned—Sailors Washed Ashore.

Copenhagen, Sept. 30.—The heaviest gale in living memory is sweeping over Denmark and the North Sea all along the German coast. There has been considerable damage, and the German air manoeuvres in the neighbourhood of Keil are reported abandoned. A telephone from the west coast of Jutland says that a number of bodies of German sailors were washed ashore north of Esbjerg. Telegraphic communication is interrupted.
