WHY ALL THIS DELAY

IN SENDING QUEEN'S ENGINEERS HOME FROM VALCARTIER? Students of the School of Mining Await Their Professors - Engineers Doing Only Laborers' Work. Professors and students at Queen's University are very dissatisfied with the manner in which the science students are being detained at Valcartier camp. They feel that if it is the intention of the military department to hold them for some time, they should let it be known. For some days there have been reports that the engineers would leave for home at a certain time, but these plans are changed at the last minute. It is stated that the men are lying around the camp grounds with nothing to do, anxiously waiting for the word to come from Ottawa to start for Kingston. It is not only the engineers who are suffering but the students who have registered at the university are deprived of the lectures which some of the officers are scheduled to give each week. It is stated that the Queen's engineers have been called upon to do work at Valcartier which laboring men should do.

PLUCKY CANADIAN GIRL

Put On At Stations Between Berlin and Rotterdam. A story of pluck and persistence is told of Miss Ethel Brown, a daughter of Joseph Brown, Bloomfield, Prince Edward county, in connection with her escape from Berlin, Germany. A teacher in a Quaker college in New York, she went to Germany for a post-graduate course in German, found that war had been declared, and being a British subject, was two weeks in going to Rotterdam, as she was put off at every intervening station. While Miss Brown was in a German town an English woman, accused of being a spy, was subjected to a harrowing indignity before German guards before she was allowed to proceed.
