

GIVE AID TO BELGIUM TO CALL CITY COUNCIL

THE EVANGELICAL ALLIANCE TOOK ACTION ON MONDAY.

It is Probable That Voluntary Offerings Will be Made For so Worthy a Cause — Robert Meek Chosen Treasurer.

At a meeting of the Evangelical Alliance, yesterday, Oct. 5th, at which representatives of the various Protestant churches were present, it was suggested that Kingston should have in some form an opportunity of contributing to the Belgium Relief Fund. The subject was introduced by Rev. Dr. Macmillan and the proposal supported by Bishop Piddell. The view was adopted that Belgium, an absolutely innocent victim of this cruel war, was worthy of sympathy and help. It is not proposed that there should be a systematic canvass or pressure brought to bear upon any one; a small contribution should, in this case, be regarded as a privilege rather than a duty. It was resolved to ask R. Meek, president of the Board of Trade, to act as treasurer of the local fund, and to transmit the amount received to the treasurer in Montreal. The alliance is a voluntary association and has no power to legislate for the churches, but it is believed that the suggestion of allowing a collection to be taken in the churches will receive a hearty response. Rev. G. I. Campbell and Prof. W. G. Jordan were appointed as a committee of arrangements.

TO SETTLE PRINCESS STREET PAVING CONTRACT.

Some Changes Wanted In the Specifications — The Work Held Up at Present.

A round-robin is being circulated by Ald. Graham requesting the acting mayor, Ald. Couper, to call a special meeting of the City Council for Wednesday evening to settle the contract in connection with the paving of Princess street, between Clergy and Barrie streets.

Although the Kingston Construction company started the work of paving on the instructions of the mayor, no contract has yet been signed, and no money can be paid over. The construction company and the street railway company are desirous of having some changes made in the specifications. One change has already been made, viz., the laying of six instead of four inches of concrete under the tracks. A further addition wanted is the putting of a stone dust cushion between the ties at a cost of about \$500 more. The Board of Works will likely ratify this, so that council can authorize the signing of a proper contract for work legally begun. At present the work is being held up.

"Long Way To Tipperary" New English Battle Song

London, Sept. 12 (Special correspondence).—The route to Tipperary, that famous old spot in Ireland, famed for generations in song and story the world over, is of no strategic importance in the great war, but it is playing no mean part these days in upholding what staid military experts call the "morale" of the British troops fighting the Germans in France. "It's a Long Way To Tipperary" has come to be the English battle song in the present war. It will go down in history and it is nothing at all but a London music hall ditty. As they go into battle the Germans thunder their "Die Wacht am Rhein," the French chant their "Marseillaise," solemn and impressive, and the Belgians fight gallantly with their beautiful "Brabanconne" on their lips, but the British sing no national air. "Tommy Atkins" goes into the fray shouting an inconsequent vaudeville blarney that has in it not a word about death or valor, glory or pathos. And, lest Americans do not know the words of this epoch-making chorus, here they are, fated for some unthought-of reason to become historic: It's a long way to Tipperary, It's a long way to go, It's a long way to Tipperary, To the sweetest girl I know. Good-by, Piccadilly! Farewell, Leicester Square! It's a long way to Tipperary, But my heart's right there.

The author-composer of this imperishable lyric is Jack Judge, a music hall artist, and there is probably no man in the world more surprised than he at the "far flung" value it has so suddenly received. The British hero sings when reveille sounds; he sings it route marching to drown the monotony of "hoo-ty-hoo-ty-hoo-ty, slog-it-up and down again"; he has familiarized his French comrades with "Le Chemin a Tipperary," and he sings it when he takes his position in the teeth of a raking shell fire. But why he chooses this particular air nobody knows.
