GIVE AID TO BELGIUM TO CALL CITY COUNCIL

THE EVANGELICAL ALLIANCE TO SETTLE PRINCESS STREET TOOK ACTION ON MONDAY.

It is Probable That Voluntary Offerings Will be Made For so Worthy a Cause - Robert Meek Chosen Treasurer.

At a meeting of the Evangelical Alliance, yesterday, Oct. 5th, at which representatives of the various Protestant churches were present, it was suggested that Kingston should have in some form an opportunity of contributing to the Belgium Relief Fund. The subject was introduced by Rev. Dr. Macgillivray and the proposal supported by Bishop Pidwell. The view was adopted that Belgium, an absolutely innocent victim of this cruel war, was worthy of sympathy and help. It is not proposed that there should be a tematic canvass or pressure brought to bear upon any one; a small contribution should, in this case, be regarded as a privilege rather than duty. It was resolved to ask Meek, president of the Board Trade, to act as treasurer of the local fund, and to transmit the mount received to the treasurer in Montreal. The alliance is a voluntary association and has no power to legislate for the churches, but it is believed that the suggestion of allowing a collection to be taken in the churches will receive a hearty response. Rev. G. I. Campbell and Prof. W. G. Jordan were appointed as a committee of arrangements.

"Long Way To Tipperary" New English Battle Song

London, Sept. 12 (Special correspondence).—The route to Tipperary, that famous old spot in Ireland, famed for generations in song and story the world over, is of no strategical importance in the great war. but it is playing no mean part these days in upholding what staid military experts call the "morale" of the British troops fighting the Germans in France.

"It's a Long Way To Tipperary" has come to be the English battle song in the present war. It will go down in history and it is nothing at all but a London music hall ditty.

As they go into battle the Germans thunder their "Die Wacht am Rhein," the French chant their "Marseillalse," sonorous and impressive, and the Belgians fight gallantly with their beautiful "Brabanconne" on their lips, but the British sing no national air.
"Tommy Atkins" goes into the fray shouting an inconsequent vaudeville jingle that has in it not a word about death or valor, glory or pathos.

And, lest Americans do not know the words of this epoch-making chorus, here they are, fated for some unfathomed reason to be ome historic:

It's a long way to Tipperary, It's a long way to got It's a long way to Tipperary, To the sweetest girl I know. Good-by, Piceadilly; Farewell, Lelcester Square; It's a long, long way to Tipperary, But my heart's right there.

The author-composer of this imperishable lyric is Jack Judge, a music ball artist, and there is probably no man in the world more surprised than he at the "far flung" volue it has so suddenly received.

The British hero sings when revelle sounds; he sings it route marching, to drown the monotony of "boots-boots-boots, slog zin' up and down again;" he has familiarized his French comrades with "Le Chemin a Teeperaire," and he sings it when he takes his position in the teeth of a raking shell fire. But why he chooses this particular air nobody knows,
