

QUEEN'S AND OTTAWA

TO PLAY RUGBY GAME HERE NEXT SATURDAY.

"Ken" Williams and "Jack" Hazlett Will Punt Against Each Other—Queen's Engineers Return Anxiously Awaited.

At three o'clock on Saturday afternoon in the Athletic grounds the first rugby game of the season will be played by Queen's against Ottawa Rough Riders. This decision was made by the Athletic committee of Queen's on Monday afternoon after a communication was read from the Ottawa authorities asking if a game could be arranged.

There was great enthusiasm as soon as the decision was made known, as the boys are anxious to show the results of their constant hard practising. The Ottawa bunch are very strong this year, and the local squad will have to put up a strong fight to get the honors. With "Ken" Williams on the back division, one of the best if not the two best punters in Canada, will be playing against each other. "Jack" Hazlett is considered a star punter and a good exhibition between these two men is promised.

"Jack" Williams, who is now playing quarter, instead of centre-half as formerly, is the manager of the Ottawa team. The last time he played in Kingston was about six years ago when the Hamilton Tigers defeated the Ottawa team in the season's championship game. The game on Saturday is the only subject of conversation in the local rugby circles just now, and a record attendance is expected. All the men who have any prospects or hopes are now out practising harder than ever and taking all kinds of chances to show what they can do.

There was a good practice on Monday afternoon with over fifty men in the field. Grant Smith and Sherman Hill, two ex-collegiate players were out with the rest and were put through some stiff work by "Ken" Williams.

Everything is tied up at the college, however, until Prof. Lindsay Malcolm arrives. The boys are out every afternoon, but there has been no signal code made nor any plucking of the players as yet. If the engineers return in a few days, Queen's chances are excellent, as immediately they return organization will be started and the team put on a playing basis. It is to be hoped now that the engineers' work in Valcartier is finished so that Col. Sam, before he goes off on his third day to the woods, will order their return to Kingston.

THE LATE REV. DR. SPARLING

His Death Was Sudden and Extremely Sudden.

The Rev. Dr. Sparling, Carleton Place, died of heart failure, on Sunday afternoon, on his return from Appleton, where he had been preaching. He was seen to fall from his bicycle, just as he was entering the limits of Carleton Place. Herbert Murphy ran quickly to his assistance, but the beloved pastor expired in a few minutes. His death was the more sorrowful because owing to the fact that Mrs. Sparling was on a visit to her daughter at Winchester when the angel of death touched her husband.

It is rather a coincidence that the first service was conducted when a student was the same one he was occupying when death came. The funeral is to occur at Carleton Place on Thursday morning, with burial in Brockville in the afternoon. The late Rev. William Henry Sparling was born near St. Mary's, Ontario, sixty-two years ago. He was educated at the public schools of his native place, the Cobourg Collegiate Institute and Victoria University, from which he graduated a B.A. in 1879. Prior to taking up theology he was in the printing trade. The Montreal Wesleyan Theological College conferred the degree B.D. (honoris causa) on him in 1910. In 1884 the deceased married Miss Ada, daughter of the late George (Black) Doucette, registrar of Brockville, who survives with one daughter, Miss Pauline Sparling, organist of the Methodist church at Winchester.

The deceased was a zealous pastor, an able and fluent speaker. His sermons were always sound and logical explanations of the holy scriptures. His death leaves a blank in the Methodist church that will be hard to fill. He has gone to the reward of a well spent life consecrated to the service of the Chief Pastor of souls.

Rev. Dr. Sparling was a leading divine. Among the more important charges he held were in Sherbrooke, Montreal, Quebec, Kingston and Brockville. He also served as president of the Montreal conference. Rev. W. F. Fitzgerald, of St. Paul's Anglican church, expressed sincere regret at the demise of Dr. Sparling, and greatly admired and esteemed him, he said. "He was a man of fine attainments and a good man. It would have been a melancholy pleasure for me to attend his funeral, but I find it an impossibility."
