Flies For Clipping.

After cutting out the articles from the newspapers you wish to save, the most convenient system is to file them.

To do this, buy a package of large business envelopes and label them at one end.

Label them "Fruits," "Cakes," "Household Hints," etc., to suit yourself.

Under the general head write the name of each recipe added to the envelope and when tried, if good, write "G" or "Good" after the name on the envelope. If not what you desire, throw away the recipe and cross out the name.

You may put smaller envelopes in the large one if desired.

In "Household Hints" envelope put one labeled "Laundry" others "Cleaning," "Sewing," etc.

Put the envelopes in a box or fasten with a rubber band.

Be sure and mark on envelope each recipe added to it.

If this method is used, when you desire a recipe, you can find it without trouble.

Choice butcher's steers, \$8 to \$8.25; good butcher's steers, \$7.75 to \$8; medium butcher's steers, \$7 to \$7.50; common butcher's steers, \$6.50 to \$7; choice butcher's heifers, \$7.75 to \$8; common butcher's heifers, \$7.25 to \$7.50; choice cows, \$6.75 to \$7; good cows, \$6.25 to \$6.50; canners, \$5.50 to \$6.75; bulls, \$5 to \$7.25.

Feeders and stockers.—Market firm at unchanged values. Choice steers, \$7 to \$7.25; medium steers, \$6.50 to \$6.75; stockers, \$5 to \$6.25.

Milkers and springers.—Values steady at \$50 to \$95 each, bulk sold at \$75 to \$85 each.

## LIQUOR AND WARE.

What The London Times Says in Recent Issue.

The trail of the German troops is marked, as innumerable witnesses testify, by myriads of empty bottles. Their once proud soldiery is now typified by the colonel found in a stupor amid his unconscious men before a cask in an Ipermy cellar. We may contrast with this picture the spectacle presented by the allies. Russia absolutely prohibiting the sale of vodka and beer throughout her immense dominions, France forbidding the sale of absinthe, the British soldier marching through the best vineyards in existence, and temporarily demanding, as many letters tell us, his cup of tea. The great victory over drunkenness in Russia has received far too little attention in this country. Since China prescribed opium the world has seen nothing like it. We have been well reminded that in sternly prohibiting the sale of spirituous liquor Russia has already vanquished a great foe that the Germans. It is fully realized yet that for the allies and for the first time in history, this is to all intents and purposes a "teetotal" war. We hope that the indiscreet people who insist on "treating" our soldiers and sailors on their return from the front will realize it very quickly.

The fight recently waged by all the allies alike against intemperance symbolizes the other victory which must eventually be theirs. Troops who march, obeying the czar's ukase against drink, who carry in their knapsacks Lord Kitchener's admonition to adjust wine, already have an immense moral advantage over armies whose officers set their men the example of looting every cellar they find.
