CAME BACK TO FORT

AUSTRIAN ON PAROLE-ASKED TO BE MADE PRISONER AGAIN.

Said He Had Tramped All Over Canada and Could Not Get Work - Guard Placed Him in Custody Again - About Two Hundred War Prisoners.

An Austrian who is in Canada "up against it" for the want of work, is shown in the fact that prisoners of war, who have been confined to Fort Henry, are glad to get back again after being allowed out on parole.

On Friday an Austrian, who is about forty years of age, appeared at the gate at Fort Henry and asked the guard who was on duty to take him in again.

A short time ago this man was released on parole, on condition that he would not leave Canada.

Other men who have been let out on parole have asked to be taken back. Up until Saturday afternoon there were 199 prisoners inside the walls.
