THE ALLIES

In Escaping From German Encircling Movement.

OF BELGIAN PORTS WILL BE

EMPTY VICTORY. Paris Is Optimistic - Check Administered Has Proved German Inability to Press Forward Along the

Paris, Oct. 15 .- With the Franco-Belgian-British column pushing forward, forcing an acute angle of impression in the line of the German advance, and with the French maintaining a successful offensive along the centre of what now must be considered a 500-mile front, Paris was optimistic again to-day. Es caping from the German encircling movement, the allies have succeeded in delivering a smashing blow. The fighting along this line is ter-

Paris expects to hear of German occupation of Belgian channel ports but the success whch seems to be attending the allies offensive slightly nland, will make this occupation an empty victory. Officials here maintain that the check so far ad ministered has proved the Germans' inability to press forward along the coast line to French territory.

Destroyed By Fire.

Trieste, Oct. 15.-A new Austrian dreadnought, just completed, mysteriously caught fire, early today, and was gutted by flames. Six new torpedo boats were also found affame and several seriously damaged before the fire was extinguished. The entire shipyard is under military patrol to-day. The government is alarmed at the coupe, undoubtedly executed by spies.

Checked The Advance.

London, Oct. 15 .- A despatch from Ostend, dated Monday, reported a heavy engagement near Thourout, a Belgian town, twelve miles south-west of Bruges. Advancing confidently against what they imagined to be the remnants of a retreating Belgian army, a German column was ambushed by a force south of Ghent. The German soldiers were mowed down in swaths and a bayonet charge completed their rout. Some 600 dead were left on the field while the allies' losses were practically nothing. The Germans retired precipitately on Alost. A request for an armistice

was refused. Another despatch says that on Saturday and Sunday a heroic ef fort was made to save the city from fresh German visitation. fighting around Melle turned to the advantage of the defenders. Within a hundred yards of each other's positions hundreds of wounded were lying unaided and uncared for. In immediate front were two opposing armies. The German rifle fire during Sunday night was continu-

ous. They fired on everyone approaching their lines. At the moment when the defending forces were successfully rolling up the enemy threatening Ghent, a large German cavalry force was reported moving north from Ypres, and a general retreat was decided upon.
