SAYS HE WAS ROBBED

WHILE OUT ON AUTO DRIVE IN THE CITY.

John Clancy Reported to the Police That He Was "Held-up" and Relieved of \$78 — Police Are Making an Investigation Into the Case.

That he was struck over the head with the butt end of a revolver and relieved of a wad of money amounting to \$78, was the story told to the police late on Wednesday night by a stranger in the city who gave the name of John Clancy.

Clancy it appears was out enjoying an auto drive with a Kingston man and a couple of lady friends. The party made a tour of the city and afterwards a trip around the outskirts of the city.

At a lonely spot on Montreal street it is further stated, that the machine had to be stopped to make some slight repairs to the car, and it is claimed that while at this point a man came out of some shrubbery and after hitting Clancy over the head with a revolver and knocking him to the ground, went through his pockets. Clancy's male friend was on the other side of the car when the "hold-up" occurred and the assailant made off before he reached the scene.

Clancy reported the affair to the police as soon as the party got back to the city and an investigation is being made.

The young ladies received quite a fright as a result of the "hold-up."

ESTABLISHED RECORD PRICE.

Cheese Sold at 15 1/4 Cents on Frontenac Board Thursday.

The price of cheese took a jump to 15 1/4c on the Frontenac cheese board on Thursday afternoon, thereby establishing a record for the board.

This is the highest price ever paid for cheese on this board. Evidently there is one line of business that the war has not hurt. It is stated that the demand for cheese in the old country on account of the war has put the price up. As a result of the high price, there was much rejoicing among the salesmen at the meeting.

Last week cheese sold on the board for 14 1/2c. There was boarded 425 boxes of colored cheese, as follows: Elm Grove, 20; Glenvale, 30; Hartington, 30; Rose Hill, 85; St. Lawrence, 24; Silver Springs, 25; Thousand Islands, 26; Elginburg, 35; Wolfe Island, 40; Sunbury, 60; Gilt Edge, 25.

L. W. Murphy secured the entire offering, with the exception of Hartington and Sunbury, at 15 1/4c.

The Canadian Pacific Railway company has offered a scholarship giving four years' free tuition in McGill University Faculty of Applied Science to apprentices and others on the staff of the company and to employees' sons.

The council unanimously decided to give \$15,000 to the Norfolk county imperial aid fund; the united counties council of Dundas, Stormont and Glengarry granted \$1,000 to the Belgian relief fund; Brent council decided to give \$5,000 for aid of soldiers' families.
