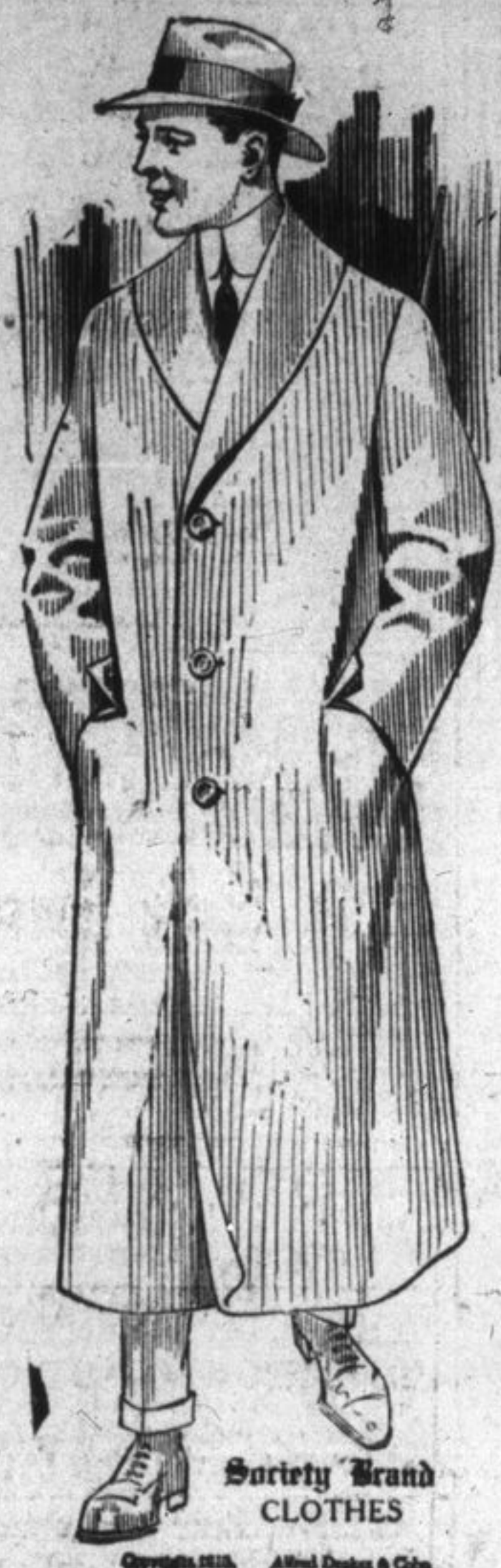


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THE CHURCH PULPITS

IN EXPLANATION MADE WITH REFERENCE TO DEAN STARR'S POSITION.

Bishop Bidwell States the Facts—The Dean Asked to Return by the First of January.

Kingston, Oct. 16—(To the Editor)—It seems desirable that the facts in connection with St. George's cathedral should be succinctly stated.

Dean Starr, who was absent in England on sick leave, found himself so far recovered by the end of July that he intimated his intention of returning in September. On the outbreak of war he offered his services as a military chaplain, but was at first refused on the score of his health. Being afterwards passed by the doctors, he was appointed to a military chaplaincy, and is now at Purfleet camp awaiting orders to proceed to the front. His engage-

ment is for three years, or so long as the war shall last. At the meeting of the vestry, held to consider the situation, the following communications from the dean were placed before those present: (1) He offered to hand over two-thirds of the income he received from the endowment to go to the maintenance of the church during his absence; (2) he said that he hoped to return by next spring, intending, I presume, to resign his present chaplaincy at that time; (3) he said that he had sent a long cable of sixty words to me when offered the appointment, asking for instructions. This I never received; (4) he cabled that the Bishop of London and the chaplain general of the forces asked that his leave might be extended in view of the work he is doing.

The vestry decided that the prolonged absence of the dean and rector of the cathedral was contrary to the best interests of the church, and on the understanding that the dean wished to retain his present position as military chaplain, a resolution asking the bishops to call for his resignation as dean and rector of St. George's cathedral.

Speaking for the Bishop of Ontario and myself, I may say that we are agreed that the chief church of the diocese cannot be left for an indefinite period without a responsible head. At the same time, we feel that this is not an occasion on which it would be desirable, nor would any one wish us, to act with excessive strictness. We have, therefore, requested Dean Starr to resume his duties at the cathedral by Jan. 1st or to resign.

It should be added that Dean Starr has paid the salary of the extra assistant organist during his absence, and that as long as Mr. Bourne was here he contributed fifty dollars a month towards his salary.

I hope that all who love St. George's cathedral will rally to its support. Excellent work is being done here at the present time, and little more than two months remains at the most to carry it over its present position. Yours faithfully, Edward J. Kingston.
