BIG PULP OUTPUT.

The Abitibi Company is Shipping 160 Tons Daily.

Iroquois Falls, Oct. 16.—The largest individual pulpmill in Canada is now providing work for a thousand men, and is shipping 160 tons of pulp daily to most of the large paper and pulp mills in the United States and Canada. Two years ago the mill here roared in a wilderness, to-day there is one of the largest industrial concerns in the Dominion of Canada in full operation. The Abitibi Pulp & Paper company commenced to ship pulp at the end of July and has maintained a steady production ever since.

Import Pebbles For Mill Work.

Washington, Oct. 16.—In 1913 nearly \$220,000 worth of flint pebbles were imported into the United States, mainly from Denmark and France. In these countries the flint occurs as irregular nodules in the chalk cliffs that border certain parts of the coast, and under the impact of the waves on the shore the hard flint becomes freed from its relatively soft chalk matter and is gathered in great quantities from the beaches for shipment to all parts of the world.

At their destination the more irregular nodules are calcined and ground to a fine powder for use in pottery manufacture, but those that have been well rounded by the waves are reserved for use in tube mills, their hardness and chemical inertness making them a desirable grinding agent.

Regina Secures Loan.

Regina, Oct. 16.—Arrangements have been made by the City of Regina with the Bank of Montreal for a loan of \$320,000, to be used for construction of improvements.

Toronto Exchange To Reopen.

Toronto, Ont., Oct. 16.—Resolutions providing for reopening of the Toronto Stock Exchange on a limited basis were passed to-day and the actual operations in the interlarded stocks will soon be resumed.

A Deal In Coffee.

Montreal, Oct. 16.—It is understood that the Brazilian Light, Heat and Power Company has purchased \$750,000 worth of coffee in Rio and São Paulo. This large amount of coffee is on the ocean at the present time and is consigned to New York by American boats. As a result of this transaction it is expected that funds will be available whereby the company can meet present obligations as well as dividend payments.

Pullman Company's Profits.

New York, Oct. 16.—Total revenue of the Pullman Co., for the fiscal year ended June 30th, 1914, was \$41,499,336, as compared with \$42,860,104 for the preceding year. The balance available for dividends (paid at the rate of 8 per cent.) on the \$12,000,000 capital stock was \$12,663,355 as against \$11,141,108 for the 1913 fiscal year.

Financial Notes.

The senate of Nicaragua has declared a moratorium.

The Standard Trust Co., Vancouver, has been appointed receiver of the assets of the Canadian Home Investment Company of that city.

New York purposes holding the big fur auctions which London formerly held but had to stop on account of the war.

The London & Southwestern railway has issued \$5,900,000 ten year 5% at 99 1/2, the proceeds to be used to electrify lines. It is understood that the issue was taken by Boulton Bros.

Carson and William Brothers, Limited; a new firm of financial agents have been incorporated with head offices in Toronto and a capital stock of \$100,000.

Production from Tough Oaks Mine at Kirkland Lake has already this year totalled \$100,000.

Announcement made last week of dividend suspensions affecting five Canadian companies, thus bringing the yearly loss to the stockholders affected to \$8,773,366.
