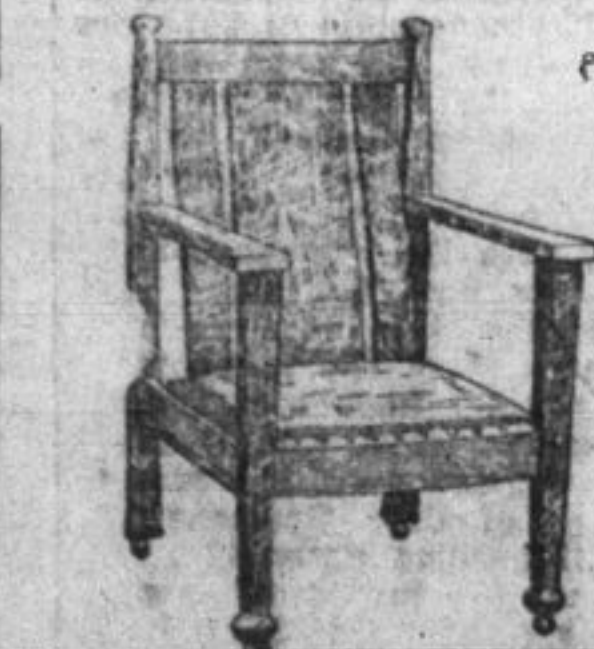

**AT THE POLICE COURT INCIDENTS OF THE DAY**

**ADMITTED SECURING LIQUOR FOR ONE ON LIST.**

The Magistrate imposed a Fine of \$35 and Costs or One Month in Jail.

Men who are found guilty of securing liquor for members of the "prohibited list" are always severely dealt with by Magistrate Farrell.

When Harry Orr, on the list, was before the magistrate some time ago, charged with having been drunk, he declared that one William Elliott was the man who served him with liquor on Sept. 30. Elliott could not be located at the time, but the arm of the law was stretched out for him, with the result that he was rounded up and stayed with a summons.

When the charge was read Elliott pleaded guilty and had no excuse whatever to offer the court. C. R. Webster was on hand to prosecute on behalf of C. W. Wright, the licensee inspector.

The magistrate imposed a fine of \$35 and costs or one month in jail. Elliott was also charged with vagrancy, but this he stoutly denied, stating that he had been working regularly, and gave the magistrate the names of the men he had been working for. This charge against him was not pressed.

A young man stood charged with drunkenness, but as it was his first time before the court he was given a chance. Early Saturday evening he was arrested by Constables Timmerman and Clark.

**HAD A NARROW ESCAPE.**

**Capt. H. McMaster Fell Into the Harbor.**

Capt. H. McMaster, of the M. T. company had a close shave from being drowned on Saturday evening about six o'clock, when standing on the deck of the steamer Port Dalhousie speaking to Captain Joseph Napier, the captain of that boat. The steamer was unloading grain at Richardson's elevator at the time. Captain McMaster was leaning backwards against the railing on the port-side of the steamer when it suddenly gave away. He was sent heading into the water. Captain Napier gave the alarm and soon a small boat was lowered and manned for the rescue. Considerable difficulty was experienced before the captain was finally landed and it was only the prompt assistance rendered that saved his life. The victim was so badly shaken up that a cab was secured to have him taken to his residence on University avenue.

**Had Accident Met By a Cusheadland Young Man.**

Joseph Woods, son of George Woods, Cusheadland, met with a serious accident on Saturday afternoon about three o'clock. He was working on a hay press on the farm of Frederick Scott. The plunger of the press caught his right foot and before the horse was supplied, the power could be stopped his foot was smashed. The skin over the ankle was torn off and several bones in the foot were broken and smashed. He was driven to the city where Dr. J. F. Sparks attended him. He is at present staying with W. Toner, at the court house.

**IN MILITARY CIRCLES.**

Recruiting is proceeding for various Kingston Corps.

Recruiting is going splendidly in the R.C.H.A. and the 14th. Ten men were taken on the strength of the artillery corps on Saturday. They are a fine-looking bunch.

The granting of pardons to deserters has allowed a great number of men to enlist. Several are on the waiting list here. They are of value, as they have had more or less military training.

About thirty of the 14th have volunteered for overseas service. They are not under pay yet but report every day at the barracks.

The 5th company, R.C.E., has posted notices through the college asking for volunteers. This corps is recruiting rapidly and should get the required number in a very short time.

It is expected that Kingston will be able to send as many men to the front as on the first contingent.

**CHILDREN'S DAY AT ST. GEORGE'S.**

Children's Day was observed in St. George's hall on Sunday afternoon. The service was conducted along the same lines as in London, England. Rev. Crozier Magee was the life and soul of the service and he had every child completely under his control. Throughout the service Mr. Magee paraded up and down the aisle, giving impetus to the singing of the hymns whenever they chanced to lag. His address as well as his catechising were brisk and clear. The attention and interest of both young and old was riveted. Every second Sunday afternoon Mr. Magee intends holding a similar service.
