BRITISH NAVAL STROKE WEDDED IN GANANOQUE

SANK FOUR GERMAN TORPEDO BOAT DESTROYERS.

The Undaunted Was Patrolling the German Coast And Came Upon the Enemy.

London, Oct. 19.—The secretary of the British admiralty announced that the British light cruiser Undaunted, accompanied by the torpedo boat destroyers Lance, Lennox, Legion, and Loyd engaged four German torpedo boat destroyers off the Dutch coast Saturday afternoon. All of the German destroyers were sunk.

The Undaunted carries two 6-inch and six 4-inch guns. She is a cruiser of 3,500 tons—an oil-burner—with a speed of 30 knots, just the same as her smaller foes. She is of the Arethusa class, and is a new ship.

The Undaunted is one of the three-stack light cruisers of the fleet to which has been assigned the work of patrolling the German coast, while the main British battle fleet remains in home waters. She has been searching for the fleet of destroyers which have an operating base from the estuary of the River Ems, one of which was recently sunk by a British submarine.

The Undaunted, commanded by Capt. Cecil H. Fox, who commanded the cruiser Amphion, which after sinking the German armed cruiser Koening Luise, was itself destroyed by a German mine on August 6th.

The British casualties in this naval action were one officer and four men wounded. Thirty German survivors are prisoners.

BRITAIN WILL KEEP ON.

For a Year Raising Men To Fight Germany.

London, Oct. 19.—The Times' military correspondent, replying to the Frankfurt Zeitung's statement that Great Britain was unable to raise more than 600,000 troops, says:

"We have at the present moment exactly double that number, namely, 1,200,000 men, and the number grows almost faster than we can cope with it. This is only the beginning.

"It is our way to begin to raise our arms after we break out and to go on raising them until our ultimate ends are achieved. With 1,200,000 men at home, the army in the field, and the hundreds of thousands forming in India, Canada, Australia and elsewhere, are merely the nucleus upon which other armies will eventually be built.

"It is only a question of time. It stands to reason that an empire of 400,000,000 can never lack men. This war, for us has hardly begun. We have sent merely an advanced guard into France. In the spring the remainder of the advance guard will follow and somewhere toward the end of 1915 the main body will begin to come within view.

"We are sorry for the allies that we are even slower than Russia in making our weight felt, but a year or so hence, when the allies need a rest, we shall be in a position to make good war.

"Nothing can arrest the steadily ascending figures of our army. Their cost is of little account since Germany will ultimately have to pay in territory as well as in money.

"Imagine things at their worst. Imagine the last French door-keeper evicted from Bordeaux. Then we would begin a maritime war against Germany and still be no worse off than when we began war again Napoleon."

Guards Killed: Men Escape.

Folsom, Cal., Oct. 19.—In one of the most daring outbreaks ever attempted at the state penitentiary, Capt. J. B. Drury, of the night watch, and George Phelps, a convict, were killed last night. Two guards wounded, and a life-terminer escaped.

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ARMORED MOTOR CARS RENDER GREAT SERVICE

Driver of One of Them Tells How They Are Terrorizing the Enemy.

Ostend, Oct. 19.—A driver of one of the allies' armored motor cars fitted with three Maxim guns, one at each side and one in front, which have been doing such splendid work during the last fortnight, gave the following narrative. He is a land-owning sportsman aged thirty-three, who volunteers to do anything required of him three weeks ago. He is a skilled motorist and a practical mechanic, owning several cars himself.

"We have eight men in each car, including the driver and a man who is sent to take the wheel if he is hit, and a lieutenant who commands," he said. "We generally start at 2 a.m. and go to look for the enemy. We always find them and seem to frighten them to death. We dash straight on with all the guns going as if there were no obstruction in the road. We have to back up, they always throw down tree trunks after we have passed, but we never go back the same way. We have good maps, know all the roads, and just rush on at forty miles an hour till we come to a suitable side road, then turn up and off we go. Twice we dashed through and past great columns of Germans, firing as we went, and we must have done tremendous damage. On another day one of our drivers was shot through the head, and the command beside him, a famous aviator, took the wheel. Our guns fire the same cartridge as our rifles, so we never get short of ammunition.

"Bully beef and biscuit to eat and blankets for sleeping in, on or about the car, and then we turn in about 9 p.m. as a rule. I have only slept twice in the bed since I joined. Some of the cars are fitted with Hotchkiss guns, which only fire 250 cartridges a minute. We took forty prisoners one day. They were all starving, and we fed and took them ten miles trailing behind at great risk to ourselves."

Released to Go To War. Some time ago a petition was circulated by several prominent citizens for the release of a soldier serving time in Central prison. He was sentenced about a year ago. He was a member of "B" battery before the front he asked for a parole, and this, with the help of the petition, was granted. He passed through the city on Saturday to Montreal.
