'We have at the present moment exactly double that number, namely 1,200,000 men, and the number grows almost faster whan we can ope with it. This is only the begin-

"It is our way to begin to raise our arms after war breaks out and to go. on raising them until our ulimate ends are achieved. With 1 10,000 men at home, the army in the field, and the hundreds of thousands forming in India, Canada, Australia and elsewhere, are merely the nucleus upon which other armics will eventually be built.
