

THE BOARD OF WORKS

TO STRAIGHTEN OUT THE PAVING DIFFICULTY

The City Engineer Recommends a Concrete Breakwater on King Street West at a Cost of \$30,000.

The Board of Works yesterday afternoon decided, in order to make things regular, to put through City Council next Monday evening a proper motion to accept the tender of the Kingston Construction Company for the paving of Princess street, between Clergy and Barrie streets, and to have the signing of the contract authorized.

The City Engineer reported that it would cost \$30,000 to construct a concrete breakwater on King street west. He would not recommend the use of either timbers or boulders. It was decided that the chairman and the engineer should make a report to council on Monday next with regard to the matter.

J. O. Hutton, on behalf of the Ross company, of Montreal, owners of the old Donnelly property on Outer Union street, wrote asking that Victoria street be opened from East to Union.

The necessary land had been dedicated to the city and the plan filed in the registry office. The engineer will see what the company wishes. The macadamizing of the street and the construction of drains will have to be done under the local improvement plan.

It was decided to recommend to council that Princess street, between Barrie and Alfred streets, be macadamized, under the local improvement system. The engineer said he could not guarantee to have the work done this year, owing to the lateness of the season.

Mr. Wallace offered the city his lot at the corner of Stephen and Cowdy streets, for the extension of the former street, for \$700. It seems that Mr. Wallace began the erection of two frame houses on this lot, having secured a building permit for the same.

Later, it was discovered that his lot blocked the extension of Stephen street, and the city engineer stopped the continuance of the buildings until the Board of Works decided if it would buy the land. The chairman, the engineer and Ald. Peters were appointed a committee to look into the matter and make a report for council next Monday, so that in the event of the city deciding to buy, Mr. Wallace will not be long delayed in the construction of his houses, which he will have to move from the lot.

W. R. Hamilton asks by reason of being dumped into a drain at the corner of Victoria Park and Frontenac street, which he claims was not properly protected.

W. McNamee, Upper William street, asked the board for \$20 compensation for the cutting down of four trees in front of his property. This matter was referred to the city solicitor.

THE FORT PRISONERS

NOW NUMBER 223 - MORE ARRIVED TUESDAY EVENING

The Prisoners Will be Furnished With Winter Clothing - Some of the Suspects Kicking Up.

The number of war prisoners at Fort Henry is now the largest since war was declared. A count made in Tuesday evening showed that 223 were in confinement at the old fortification. Some weeks ago there were 204 inside the walls, but this number has been increased during the past few days. The last lot of prisoners to arrive were brought to the city on Tuesday evening from Windsor, where they made an attempt to cross the American border.

In the course of a couple of days, the prisoners will be furnished with winter clothes. A supply consisting of a heavy sweater, socks, caps, underwear and moccasins has arrived at the fort.

At the present time there are no prisoners confined to the hospital at the fort. There are not in serious condition. During the past few days some of the military police have been experiencing difficulty with a couple of the prisoners. On Tuesday one of the men deliberately threw some dirty water down into the well which is used by the men for washing purposes. He was placed in a cell for doing it, but was only there a few minutes when one of the other prisoners deliberately opened the door where the man was locked up.

MANY MAMMOTH SHIPS

Placed Bow to Stern, Would Measure Three Miles.

It is now known that it required thirty-one transports to accommodate the first overseas division of Canadian troops, which left Quebec on October 1st. The list of transports commanded by the government for this service secures the names of some of the largest vessels in the British merchant marine. If placed end to end, the line would measure three miles in length, or 15,783 feet. Side by side the beam of the vessels totals 2,080 feet.
