D. J. DAWSON AS CLERK TOWNSHIP OF WOLFE ISLAND.

In Point of Service He Ranks as One of the Oldest Clerks in the Province - Was Born and Raised on Wolfe Island.

Twenty-seven years continuous service as clerk of the township of Wolfe Island. Such is the record of D. J. Dawson, who resigned this position on October 1st, and this ranks him as one of the oldest township clerks in point of service in Ontario.

Mr. Dawson lays down the reins of office with a record that any person might well be proud of, for it that long time of office, he conducted his duties in an able manner, and served well the township in which he was born, for he first saw the light of day on Wolfe Island, and resided there all his life up till ten years ago when he took up residence in Kingston.

He now conducts a piano and music store at 242 Princess street. Mr. Dawson, a son of Patrick Dawson spent many years carrying on many agencies, and in this way became well acquainted in Kingston and the surrounding district. He has the history of Wolfe Island at his fingers' tips, and can recall many interesting incidents in connection with the council and its work.

When he was appointed clerk the

council was composed of the reeve and four councillors, and to-day the same number look after the business. Of the men who were serving in the council at the time he took up office, and who are still alive, he recalls Daniel Staley, who was reeve, Richard Moore, James Baker, James Briceland, who has since that time also served as reeve. J. D. Costrove, school teacher on Wolfe Island, succeeds Mr. Dawson in the position of clerk.

THE ORPHANS' HOME

ANNUAL MEETING HELD ON FRIDAY AFTERNOON.

There Are Eighty-Three Children in the Institution—The Children Sang Chorus—Several Addresses Given.

One of the happiest days of the whole year rolled around on Friday afternoon, when the children of the Orphans' Home, Union street, were given the opportunity of showing forth their skill before the assembled public, who take pleasure in attending this annual meeting of this widely-known institution. The children, under the direction of Miss E. Wilder, sang three choruses, the last of which was the favorite, "Tipperary." After the last year the whole assembly joined in the chorus. The chairman was Mayor Shaw.

The remainder of the programme was made up of short addresses to the children by Rev. W. F. Fitzgerald, Archdeacon Dobbs, Rev. G. A. Lowe and Rev. Dr. Macgillivray. Mrs. C. L. Chown, corresponding secretary, read the annual report of the management committee, which stated that the work of the home has been very satisfactory. A larger number than ever before has passed through the dormitory capacity has been taxed to its utmost. Sixty-five males and sixty-three females, making a total of 128, have been taken in, eighty-three of whom are still in the institution. The health of the children has been good, owing to the kind care of Dr. W. G. Anglin and Dr. R. E. Sparks, dentist.

Only one death has occurred, a young lad having died in the hospital of pneumonia.

The school in connection with the home, under the direction of Miss Wilder and Miss Nash, continues to make a good showing and as a result a girl pupil won first prize in the recent writing contest.

A deficit of almost \$500 is reported, caused by the increased cost of living, the marked falling of monthly payments of parents. New mattresses have been put in the dormitories and many minor improvements have been made.

The superintendent and matron, Mr. and Mrs. John Hunter, are very kind to the children and are strictly earnest to follow in the footsteps of their predecessors.

The mortgage on the new wing, which is now \$1,000, has been greatly relieved by a bequest of \$500 from the estate of the late Mrs. Mary Gray. The annual grant of \$8,000 from the Midland District School Board, also materially assists in keeping up the efficiency of this home.
