DRIVE GERMANS OUT On the Advice of His Doctor

GIVES THEM LESS THAN MONTH TO HOLD BRUSSELS.

Fall Back From Coast—Reports Continue That Enemy Will be Compelled to Evacuate Ostend.

Dunkirk, Oct. 23.—A general who is not given to boasting is quoted here as saying the position of the allied armies is better than it has ever been, and that the demoralization of the Germans is growing greater day by day. He added: "We must, certainly, expect it to be a fortnight."

There is no doubt the allies now have got the whip hand, and should succeed in driving the Germans out of France and Western Belgium within a few weeks.

Ostend certainly will be recaptured within a few days. But for the delayed retirement of the Belgian army from Antwerp, there was no reason why it should ever have been abandoned. If it is the enemy's eventual intention to hold the line—of the Meuse and the Sambre, the conquest of Antwerp is of but the smallest value to them. Between Antwerp and the Meuse is a stretch of country with no defensive positions. Antwerp must, therefore, either be abandoned or its garrison isolated.

Once the allies re-enter Brussels unless the unexpected happens, and the Germans are able to bring great reinforcements from the Russian frontier, they must fall back from France and Belgium, owing to the tremendous pressure against their right wing.

COUNT VON MOLTKE DYING.

German Chief-of-Staff Has Not Long To Live.

London, Oct. 23.—A private letter received in Amsterdam from a high official in Berlin says Lieut.-General Count Von Moltke, chief of the German general staff, is dying, according to the Exchange Telegraph's Amsterdam correspondent.

"Everything," the correspondent adds, "is being done to keep the news secret. General Von Moltke is suffering from an affection of the liver. The cure he was undergoing was interrupted in July by the German mobilization. He has now had to leave Emperor William's headquarters. General Von Falkenhayn, the Prussian minister of war, being left in charge.

"Many German officers ascribe the check to the German advance to the forced retirement of General Von Moltke."

WELL-KNOWN RAILWAY MAN

Has Splendid Sport In British Columbia.

L. A. Robinson, general passenger agent, New York Central lines, has just completed a successful hunting trip in the Yellowhead Pass region of British Columbia. He bagged two grizzly bears, three caribou and a moose and he declares that he is going back next fall. He is enthusiastic over the Grand Trunk Pacific railway and the territory which it has opened up. He was a passenger on the second through train, between Edmonton and Prince Rupert, over the newly completed western section of the line. He says the G.T.P. will lead to largely increased trade between the north-western part of the United States and Canada.

Confidence Men's Rascality.

Ottawa, Oct. 23.—Unscrupulous individuals are known to have been operating at Ottawa offering their services to contractors to procure war contracts for them by representing their case to the government on consideration of a commission on all contracts received. The matter has been brought to the attention of the government, and the arrest of Capswell in Toronto is one of the results. Other arrests, it is stated, on the same charge will follow. The methods employed by these confidence men are to inform the contractors that only by influence can they obtain the contracts, and that they are in a position to exert this influence for a consideration.

GETS FIRST V.C. OF WAR. Heroic Named Dobson Chosen For British Honor.

London, Oct. 23.—The Standard says the story of how the first recommendation for the Victoria Cross was won in the present war is told in two letters.

The first is from the hero himself, a soldier named Dobson, to his wife at North Shields. He says very modestly: "You will know by the time you receive this letter I have been recommended for the Victoria Cross, an honor I never thought would come my way. I only took my chance and did my duty to save my comrade. It was really nothing."

The second letter is by Lady Mildred Follet, whose husband commands the company to which Dobson belongs, and is addressed to Mrs. Dobson. It reads: "You will be glad to know your husband is very well and has behaved with very great gallantry. Captain Follet says: 'A thick fog came down, so I sent three men out 100 yards to our front to warn them of an attack by the enemy. After they had been there an hour the fog suddenly lifted, and they were fired on at close range. 'One man was killed, one badly wounded, and one crawled back. I did not know how to get the wounded man back, so I had to call for a volunteer, and a reservist, Dobson, at once responded and went out to fetch him. He was heavily fired at, but not hit.'"

500,000 FRESH TROOPS

French Recruits and Reserves Ready For Front.

Bordeaux, Oct. 24.—New forces are ready to join General Joffre's army. After two months' training, this year's class of recruits is fit to bear arms. It is composed of excellent material, young and enthusiastic. It will be joined at the front by the sections of the reservists not yet called to the colors, and representing probably half a million of entirely fresh troops.

Big Catches Of Fish.

How rich the waters of the Pacific ocean are in fish is shown by the September statistics for the port of Prince Rupert just received at the Grand Trunk Pacific headquarters in Montreal. The catch of the local fishing fleet during the month, comprised: 11,120 cwt. halibut, 4,440 cwt. of cod, and 10,552 cwt. of salmon. The catch at ten cents a pound would produce \$310,120. Prince Rupert has now begun to ship its fresh fish to the east in special refrigerator cars over the Grand Trunk Pacific and the October fishing is, therefore, expected to be productive of even larger catches.

Swift Current Man Wants Divorce.

Chicago, Oct. 24.—Because his wife refused to live on a farm in the Swift Current district, Saskatchewan, Orlaf Eckstrand filed a suit for divorce in the circuit court. Before Eckstrand has lived on a farm claim more than a year and returned to Chicago to induce his wife to go back with him. She refused.

Higher Grain Prices In Austria.

Venice, via Paris, Oct. 24.—According to the Foster Lloyd, a Buda Pest newspaper, grain prices in Austria are higher than in any other country throughout the world. The Gadag Lapok, the oldest Hungarian agricultural journal, declares that the farmers who are holding back their stores of grain are traitors to the fatherland.

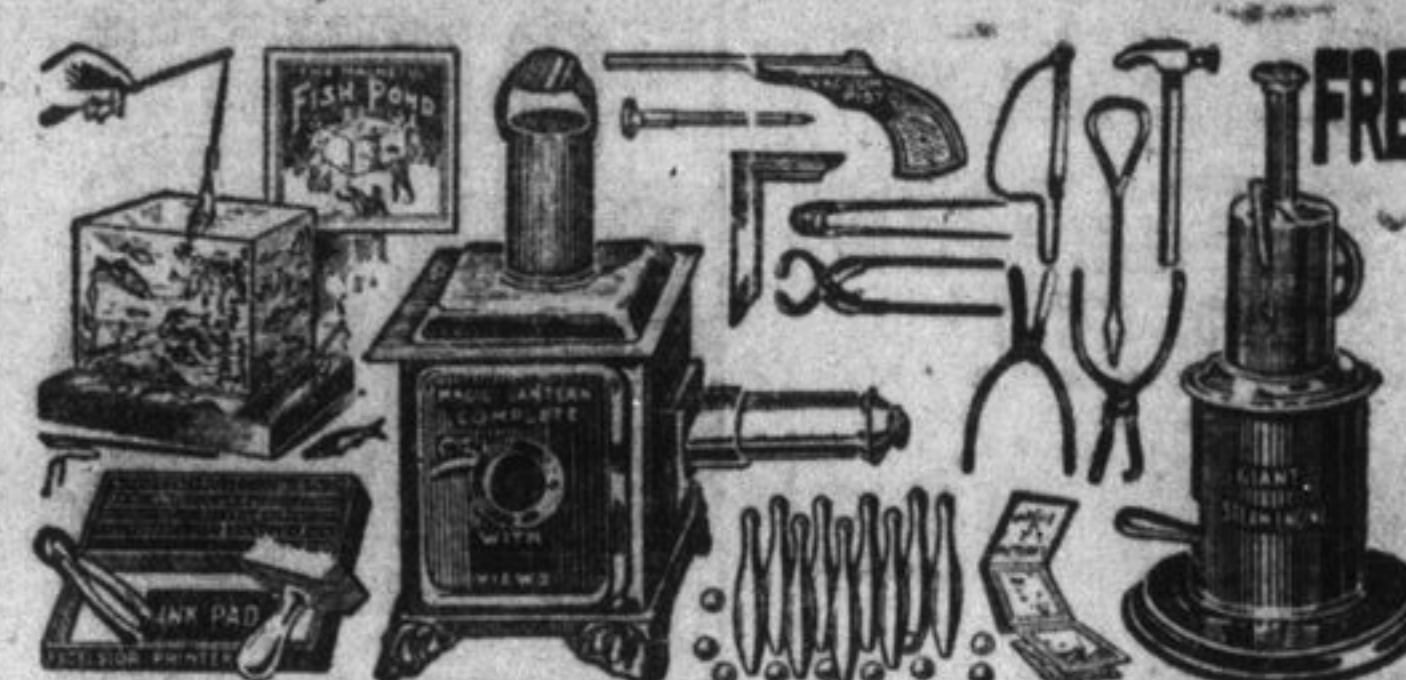
