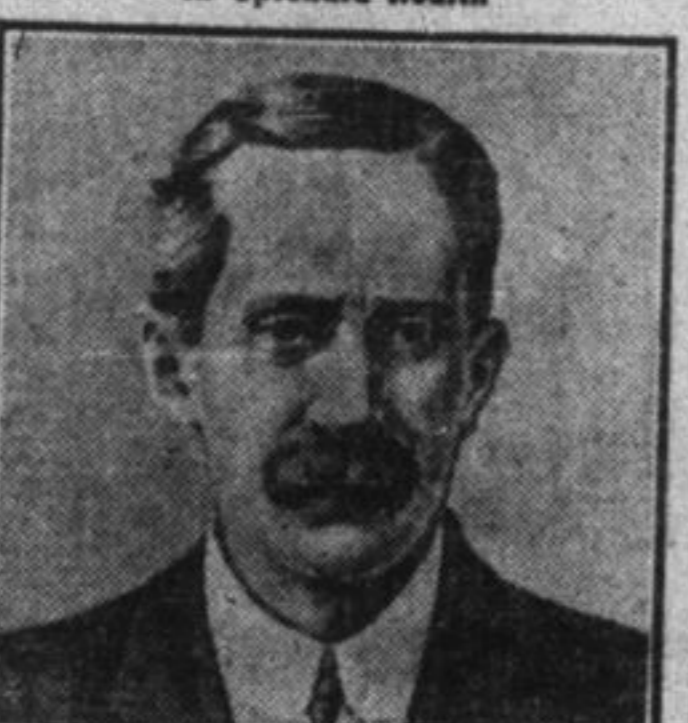

U. S. RAILROADS' FLIGHT.

Yet Earnings For Past Year Were \$124,000,000 Lower. New York, Oct. 23.—A complex report issued by the Financial Chronicle showing returns of all of the railroads of the United States whose gross earnings exceed \$100,000 per annum shows that operating revenues for the year ended June 30 last fell short by nearly \$80,000,000 of the earnings for the preceding year. At the same time efforts to cut down necessary expenditures, which will many lines seem to have exhausted their possibilities some time since were unavailing to meet any part of the loss in business. On the contrary expenses incurred in doing the smaller volume of business increased by more than \$31,000,000, making a loss in net earnings for 1914 over 1913 of \$111,000,000. If there be included with this unpleasant finding an estimated increase of more than \$12,000,000 in the year's tax the shrinkage in net earnings is brought up to \$124,000,000. Concurrently there has been a considerable increase in the amount of interest which the roads have had to pay on their capital so that the close of the year found them in many cases seriously embarrassed to meet required charges.

Brokerage Firm Stops.

Quebec, Oct. 23.—The local brokerage firm of D. D. Lesperance, M.P. announces its intention of retiring from business on October 31st. Mrs. Lesperance has one of the oldest French-Canadian brokerage houses, and has close connection with Montreal.

Cockshutt Dividend Passed.

Montreal, Oct. 23.—Directors of the Cockshutt Plow company announce the suspension of dividends on the preferred stock, which has been paying 7 per cent. per annum. As there is \$4,465,000 of this issued the annual loss to shareholders is \$462,550.

Five Companies Suspend.

London, Oct. 23.—The moratorium for bills expired on Saturday. On Tuesday five companies suspended payment and had receivers appointed, including the Canadian Pacific Lumber Co., and the Brazil and Central Paraguary railway Co.

Canadian Branch Prospers.

New York, Oct. 23.—The Canadian subsidiary of the Tobacco Products Corporation, known as Melachro company of Canada, has had a successful year and a regular dividend rate of either 20 or 25 per cent. annually will be instituted. Dividend to be paid quarterly.

Sales of the Tobacco Products Corporation in August were the largest of any month in its history.

September ran only slightly behind August. Net earnings are far beyond preferred dividend requirements.

The Tobacco Products Corporation is unusually well off in cash and is carrying \$1,500,000 in cash beyond needed requirements.

Brazil Traction Dividend.

Toronto, Oct. 23.—It is announced that the quarterly dividend of the Brazil Traction company has been declared. It is 1 1/2 per cent. and is payable Dec. 1st to holders of record Oct. 31st. The sum of \$1,500,000 is involved.

Important Announcement.

New York, Oct. 23.—The Wall Street Journal states that leading banking interests expect to be able to make an important announcement on the question of the resumption of business on the New York stock exchange in a few days.

New York, Oct. 23.—The Journal of Commerce says that an early announcement as to the reopening of the London stock exchange is expected.

Financial Notes.

Stanfield's Limited, underwear manufacturer, of Truro, N.S., is reported to have passed the dividend on its common stock.

Montreal is to have a new dry dock, to be constructed by the Canadian Vickers company, Limited, at Longue Pointe, at a cost of \$165,000.

The Premier Motor Car company, one of the largest automobile manufacturing concerns in Indiana, is in the hands of the Fletcher Savings and Trust company of Indianapolis as receiver.

It is expected that New York exports for this week will break all records for year. They are averaging \$4,000,000 a day, and on Saturday, when Suruga clears with her cargo of motor trucks valued around \$5,000,000, figures will climb to record figures.

Approximately \$150,000,000 worth of supplies, food, blankets, motor trucks, ammunition, etc., not including horses and mules, have been sold to European nations, now engaged in the great war, Germany excepted, in the last ten weeks.

International Harvester Co., of America granted permission by Missouri Supreme Court to resume business in Missouri on condition that it comply with the States.

The Lackawanna Steel Co., reports a deficit of \$457,210 for the quarter ended September 30th, against a surplus of \$1,109,203 last year. For nine months the deficit was \$1,240,890 against a surplus of \$3,854,399 in 1913.

It is said that Sir Rodolphe Forget is the real purchaser of the plant of the Eastern Canada Power & Pulp Co., and that A. E. Bradbury of Ottawa was settling for him in buying the plant recently for \$200,000, after the company had been in liquidation for some time.

There are 603 German and Austrian prisoners of war in Canada, according to the latest reports which have been received by the government from the various places of detention throughout the country. About 400 of these are Austrians and the rest Germans.

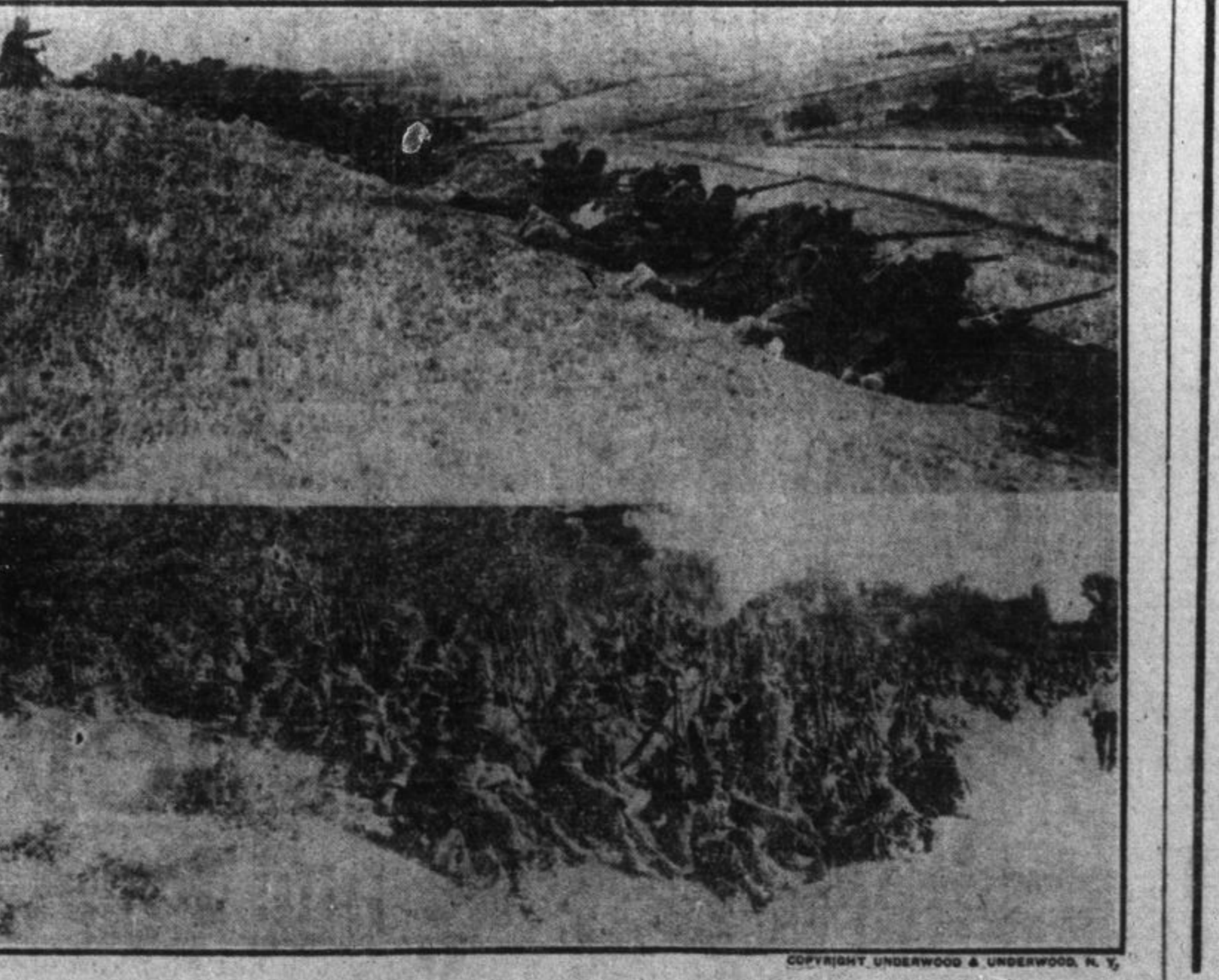
