IN SECOND CANADIAN CONTINGENT FOR THE FRONT.

Regiments Report Number of Men Who Have Offered—Forty-Seven Signed Up From 14th Regiment.

The call for the enlistment of a second Canadian contingent has met with a ready response from the officers and men of the different corps of the 3rd division. Although the officer commanding the division sent out orders only a few days ago for each corps in the division to enlist seventy-five men, who would be sent to the front, about the end of December, some of the recruiting officers have secured that number already. In some cases the enlistment has not been as brisk as in other places, but it is expected that the required number will be secured at an early date.

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MORE OFFICERS HAVE APPLIED THAN ARE NEEDED

For the Second Contingent—Col. Hughes Says That Mobilization Will Commence Here Next Week.
 Lieut. Col. W. S. Hughes, commanding officer of the 14th regiment, who will command the overseas battalion from the 3rd division, arrived in the city on Tuesday morning. When seen by the Whig Col. Hughes stated that he was not in Kingston in connection with military matters. Prison matters had called him here.
 He further stated that he expected that the men from the different regiments of the division would commence to gather in Kingston about Tuesday or Wednesday of next week. At the present time the buildings where the men are to be quartered are not in shape for sleeping quarters.
 Col. Hughes stated that he had received letters from officers and men from all over the dominion who have served under him and are anxious to go to the front.
 One letter which was received recently from an ex-officer of the 14th regiment states that he is so anxious to go to the front that he would go as a private sooner than be left at home.
 At the present time it looks very much as though John McDonald McWatt, of Vancouver, B. C., who was for years an officer in the 14th regiment, will cross the water with the volunteers from the 3rd division under Col. Hughes.
 Up until the present time one hundred officers have volunteered their services and still more are putting in their applications. In the course of a couple of weeks it is expected that half that number will again will have applied.
 As only about forty officers will accompany the battalion it will mean that only the men with the best qualifications will be selected.

THE TIME HAS ARRIVED

For Reciprocal Medical Relations Between Britain and Ontario.
 At a meeting of the medical faculty of Queen's University, held on Friday, October 23rd, the following resolution was passed unanimously:
 "Whereas a number of physicians registered in Ontario have volunteered for imperial army medical service and have not been accepted because the Ontario qualification is not recognized in Great Britain;
 "Resolved, that in the opinion of the medical faculty of Queen's University the time is opportune to establish reciprocal relations between the General Medical Council of Great Britain and the Medical Council of Ontario.
 And resolved, that the faculty suggest to the officers and executive of the Ontario Council that a special meeting of the council be held at the earliest possible moment to deal with this important matter."

QUEEN'S AND VARSITY

Will Play Senior Rugby Game Here On Saturday.
 It is decidedly likely that Queen's will defeat Varsity when they meet here on Saturday. Queen's players now know their weak points and are remedying them. If they can hold Mc Gill down till the last ten minutes it seems reasonable that they can trim the Toronto team. The men are not nearly as much afraid of defeat at the hands of Varsity as they were on Saturday last. They made "Shag" think of last year's surprise, and it looks as if it were Varsity's turn this year. The Queen's team had a light workout on Monday afternoon, but Tuesday, at three o'clock, the heavy work again begins. Tackling seems to be their weak point. This is being attended to.
