QUESTION OF RELIEF

DISCUSSED AT A MEETING ON TUESDAY EVENING.

But no Action Was Taken Pending Another Meeting To Be Held Shortly—Representatives Present From Various Organizations.

On Tuesday night there was a meeting in the City Council chamber of representatives of various charitable organizations in the city, together with representatives from the City Council, the Board of Trade, and the Trades and Labor Council, relative to what action will be taken towards providing for those who will need help during the winter. Plans were discussed but no definite action was taken, the meeting standing adjourned to be called together again very shortly by Mayor Shaw, who presided at the meeting. Ald. O'Connor was appointed secretary for the meeting.

There is a proposition on to give the surplus over the \$50,000 raised for the patriotic fund for relief work, but this has not been altogether decided as yet, and until definite information is received regarding it, the committee is not in a position to deal with the matter. Mayor Shaw will secure the much desired information.

Then there is the question of raising additional funds by making a canvass of the city to be considered and decided upon, together with having the funds handled by a central committee. If a general canvass of the city is made for funds Mayor Shaw is in favor of having the ladies make the canvass.

"The men carried out the other campaign for the patriotic fund and I think that the ladies should undertake this," said his worship, "and I think that if they took hold of it they would make a great success of it."

In answer to Miss Muckleston, Mayor Shaw stated that the city was giving employment to as many men as could be placed; in fact no man had as yet been turned away, and he gave Miss Muckleston to understand that she could send all unemployed men to the city hall in search of work. Between the civic light plant and the engineer's department quite a large number of men is being kept busy.

THE LATE GEORGE CLIFF

Passed Away At His Home on Tuesday Night.

George Cliff, real estate agent, died at his residence, 153 University avenue, on Tuesday night, having been in ill-health for some time.

The late Mr. Cliff was born at York-shire, England, sixty-two years ago. When a lad of about eight years of age he and the other members of the family came to Canada. After spending a year at Olden and a couple of years at other towns, he settled down in Kingston, making this his home.

During his younger days he ran a successful tobacconist store on Princess street, but being of a rather enterprising nature, he sold out and went to California, where he took over a fruit ranch. Returning to Kingston, he made several trips to the west, principally to Edgmont, at which point he figured in several large land deals. He lived in Edgmont several years. His health becoming impaired, doctors advised him to go back to the east. For a year he resided in Toronto, and returned to Kingston two years ago. For some time past Mr. Cliff suffered from heart trouble.

The late Mr. Cliff was a member of Queen Street Methodist church and was known by a wide circle of friends. He leaves to mourn his loss, a wife, one brother and two sisters—Joseph, residing on the Bath Road; Mrs. George Hunter and Miss Sarah Cliff, both of this city.

The funeral will be held on Thursday afternoon at two o'clock, from his late residence. The service will be conducted by Rev. G. I. Campbell, and the remains will be buried in Ottawa-qui cemetery.

FIFTEEN QUEEN'S ENGINEERS

Have Been Discharged as Quarters Are Too Small.

On account of the quarters at the Regiopolis college being overcrowded with the No. 5 company Canadian Field Engineers of Queen's university, it has been found necessary to allow fifteen of the engineers, who are graduates, to leave for their homes. There are 119 students in the corps.

It has been arranged that the men will sleep on the two floors of the Regiopolis college. The meals will be served in one of the buildings at Queen's university. Reid and Hambrook will likely have charge of the rations.

It is expected that in the course of a brief period, Capt. Lindsay Malcolm, who is in command of the corps, will be promoted to the rank of major, and Lieut. D. Ellis, who is second in command, will be promoted to captain. These promotions are necessary as a result of Major A. Macgillivray, who was in command, leaving for the front with the first Canadian contingent.

During the evenings the engineers study on the top floor of the Civil engineering building.

THE MUNICIPAL ELECTIONS

Can be Held, if Desired, on New Year's Day.

Kingston can have its municipal elections on New Year's day if it so desires. A recent enactment by the Ontario Legislature permits nominations on the 23rd, of December with polling on the first of January. Before this, however, can happen the council must pass a by-law not later than the 15th of Nov. and the by-law shall remain in force from year to year until repealed. The privilege of New Year's as election day, is now extended to any municipality that feels inclined to take advantage of this new statute.

The question of taking advantage of this new regulation is open for discussion, and electors might take it upon themselves to express their opinion to members of the council. If the people are so inclined there is ample opportunity for the passage of the by-law. The Whig favors the holding of election on New Year's day.

DEATH WAS ACCIDENTAL

Coroner's Jury Investigated Death of J. G. Ballie.


A coroner's jury investigated the death of J. G. Ballie, brother of W. M. Ballie, chief of police, who died at Saginaw, Mich., from injuries he received when struck by an automobile and rendered a verdict of "accidental death."

Mr. Ballie was struck by the automobile at a street crossing and was carried by the car for a distance of about sixty feet. The car was travelling at a very fast rate of speed. The accident occurred on Monday afternoon of last week, and his death occurred Friday night. On Wednesday, the doctors gave up all hopes of his recovery.

THE LATE COSMO CARTWRIGHT

The End of a Bright Young Queen's Graduate.

On Wednesday morning the death occurred of Cosmo T. Cartwright, after a lingering illness. A serious accident in his youth necessitated the amputation of one of his limbs, and this was an indirect cause of his death. The deceased was a mining engineer in the department of mines in Ottawa, where he resided. He was born thirty-two years ago in Portsmouth. He graduated from Queen's in mining in 1911, finishing his B.Sc. course in 1907.

The father of the deceased is Rev. C. E. Cartwright, who was chaplain in the penitentiary, and his uncle was the late Sir Richard Cartwright. The survivors are his parents, four sisters, Mrs. Teller, of St. Louis; Mrs. Emery, Mrs. Matheson and Mrs. Alexander, of Vancouver, and two brothers, Edward, of Vancouver, and Col. George, commandant at Gasport, Eng. Mrs. Alexander is on her way to the city.
