**DESIGNS UPON CANADA.**

**Germany Had Evil Eyes Set on This Country.**

London, Oct. 28.—"German Designs upon Canada." "Another Invasion of our Country." "It will be upon the Atlantic." These are typical headlines applied to the count's latest emission.

An English diplomat, discussing the situation, says:—

"Of course, Bernstorff is right. Canada is at war with Germany in every sense of the word. Germany has as much right to land troops in Canada as Canada has to send troops to Europe against Germany, but the Canadians are not likely to lose their sleep. Bernstorff's two words, 'if possible,' mean so much.

"If Germany cannot think seriously of landing troops in England now can she hope to evade the British fleet upon the Atlantic.

"But, putting together the statements of Bernstorff and Derburg, what other conclusion can Canadians draw about German policy than that that if British sea supremacy once is overthrown, Germany will invade Canada and not South America that Germany will set the most coveted eyes?"

"As the great Bernhard said, years ago, German dreams of overseas territories nearer home than Brazil and climatically better suited to German settlers. Derburg kindly promises Canada immunity because of the Monroe doctrine, but after all, a purely national declaration like the Monroe doctrine is a far smaller scrap of paper than a solemn international treaty such as guaranteed the neutrality of Belgium.

"Bernstorff is much more likely to be reflecting the real German intentions, wholly vain though they are."

**SITUATION BRIGHTER.**

**Hon. I. B. Lucas Gets Cheering News—English Loan Available.**

Toronto, Oct. 29.—Hon. I. B. Lucas, provincial treasurer, has received some cheering news from England. Official word has come to him of the lifting of the British moratorium and the setting back into place of financial affairs.

To Ontario this will mean that a large part of the loan floated in England will be expected in the treasury coffers before long. Taking into account, however, the unsettled conditions which yet prevail in financial circles, the government is not counting strongly on a speedy return. The reception of the funds will naturally lighten the position of Ontario, which, with other large money handlers, was taken a little off guard at the outbreak of war.

**BELGIANS NEED REST**

**Times Hopes Situation May Give Them Relief**

London, Oct. 29.—The Times' military correspondent says: "The Belgians have to put up a splendid fight up the Yser, but we shall be glad to hear that the situation enables them to take a little rest to rest and to incorporate the numerous young Belgians, who are joining the ranks."

"The Germans boasted that only two Belgian divisions had escaped from Antwerp, but this statement was quite incorrect and the Belgian field army is still strong. It has, however, fought continuously since the first days of the war and if it is to give its full fighting value hereafter, it will be all the better for a little rest. Ample forces of the best quality are available to relieve it."

**Resign Philip To Go To War.**

Niagara Falls, Oct. 29.—Capt. Guy B. Gordon, now stationed at Port Colborne, will go to the front with the second contingent. He was notified that he would be accepted some time ago, after he had been rejected for the first contingent. Capt. Gordon resigned his post at Christ Church at the outbreak of the war. He is the only minister in this section of the country who will go to the front as a regular soldier.

**TRAGEDY OF BATTLE**

**Russian Jew Inmate After Killing Austrian Hebr.**

Vilna, Russia, Oct. 28.—In the hospital at Petrograd I have seen a Jewish soldier, who was raving mad. His madness resulted from the following occurrence:

A Russian machine gun battery was occupying a domed position, and causing havoc among the ranks of a Russian battalion, which was only lightly entrenched. The battalion was ordered to charge a detachment of infantry covering the machine gun battery, and some six hundred paces away from the Russian lines.

Among those in the first line was this Jewish soldier. He reached the ranks of the Austrians, and in a man-to-man bayonet fight he drove his bayonet through the chest of his opponent. As the Austrian fell, wounded to death he gasped the Hebrew death prayer, which begins: "Hear, O Israel! The Russian Jew soldier fell in a faint. When he recovered he was a raving lunatic.

A wounded officer gave me the following account of the capture of an entire Bohemian regiment in Galicia.

"We had only recently left Lemberg, and were pursuing the rear guard of the main Austrian army. I was in the advance guard of our corps, and the task was appointed to us of outflanking the Austrian division which was making toward Jaroslau. We succeeded in surrounding a regiment, and took nearly two thousand prisoners.

"Contrary to reports which I had heard that the Austrian Slav troops were offered by Germans, the officers of this regiment proved to be all Bohemians. Not a shot was fired."

**SHARE BELGIUM'S WOE.**

**Germans in Austria Victims of Servian Cruelty.**

Copenhagen, Oct. 29.—Germany's hands are too full at present for her to pay any serious attention to the desperate cry for help which comes to Berlin from the scarred and desolate Belgium. Through the Serbian sweep through towns and villages as the Germans did in Belgium. This great cry comes from leading German citizens in the Hungarian provinces of Croatia and Slavonia, and the appeal is published in Berlin. It declares that German citizens in many towns in these provinces have been victims of Servian murder and plunder. In thousands of cases nothing has been left of their homes but walls.

There is a veiled complaint that the military and civil authorities have been unable to do sufficient to re-establish these people in homes. The loss of property in these twelve towns is said to amount to millions of pounds sterling. Such a uniform, he said, would have an enrollment of 5,295,864 souls.

"If Methodists were united to-day," said Mr. Daniels, "they could mobilize an army of righteousness which might well put to flight the evils of our country. All denominations have agreed among the heathen not to encroach upon each other's territory, and yet one great family of Christendom cannot agree at home. As proof of the solidity of construction, the writer states that rain water was able to pass without interruption from the beginning of October.

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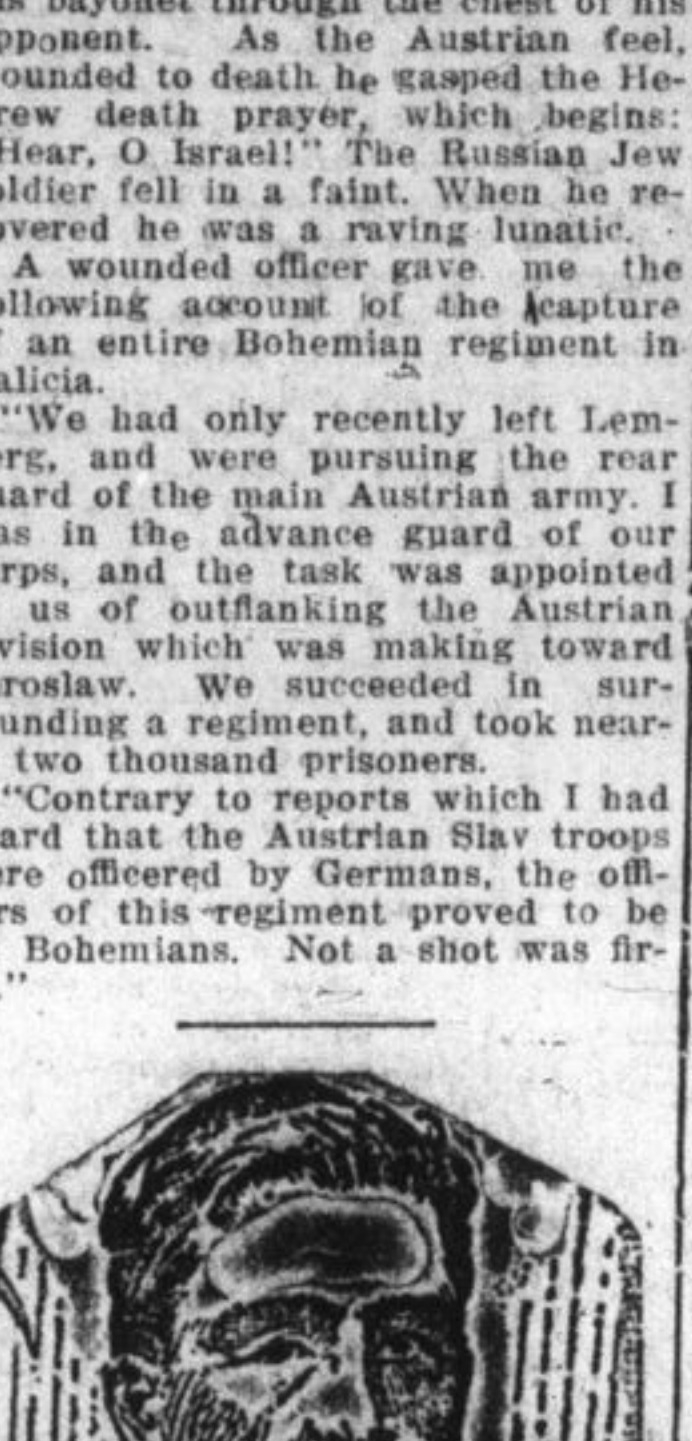

**USE STEEL BREAST PLATE.**

Enables Soldiers to Rest Before Bayonet Charge

Paris, Oct. 29.—The Journal de France states that the French infantry have recently gained much ground in the Argonne region through the use of steel breast plates, which, although unable to resist point-blank bullets, are nevertheless impenetrable at a range which permits troops to pause before the last rush with the bayonet.

The Journal de Rennes announces that the Russian government decided to adopt the breastplate at the outbreak of the war, and placed immense orders with a factory at St. Hilaire de Harcourt, which had the exclusive manufacturing rights.

The French government has also now ordered large quantities, and has released the reservists employed in the factory, which is busy night and day.

**IRISH ARE INCENSED.**

Kitchener Refuses Nationalists as Brigade Unit.

London, Oct. 29.—The refusal of the war office to sanction the presentation of colors to regiments of Irish nationalist volunteers has aroused intense feeling in Ireland and among the Irish in England. The nationalist charge that Lord Kitchener is behind the order, and says that recruiting in Ireland has been hampered by the field marshal's unwillingness to have the Irish brigade fight as a separate organization, commanded by Irish officers.

It is known that the Irish nationalist leaders feel that the British war secretary is antagonistic, but the military men say that Lord Kitchener's attitude is due to his unwillingness to sacrifice brave soldiers under untrained leaders, insisting that their officers be picked men, versed in the science of war. The matter seems certain to be aired when parliament meets.
