German Nurses Persecute Russian Sisters of Mercy.

London, Oct. 29.-The Petrograd correspondent of the Standard writes: "The Russian Sisters of Mercy who have returned to Petrograd after having been taken prisoners by the Germans, give an account of the savagery displayed toward them by German women. One of the sisters said "After we had been taken prisoners, we were marched off under military escort to the nearest German medical station, and there detained three hours. Thence we were dispatched to the nearest German town, hospital. We looked after the Russian

and German wounded. "German women did their best ! torture us, and occasion us the greatest unpleasantness. We were hated not only by the women residents of the towns where we stayed, but also to a much greater extent by the German Sisters of Mercy. Their hatred went so far that they refused to work

in the hospitals with us.
"The officials of the town did know what to do with us, and sent an official inquiry to Berlin. The reply came to send us back to Russia and this the authorities duly carried out. We do not yet knaw if we shall be sent back to the front, but we all have a burning desire to continue to


