DR. W. G. ANGLIN WILLING TO GO TO FRONT.

A Call Made For a Senior Surgeon For the Second Contingent—Wanted For the Service in January Next.

At a recent meeting of the Medical Society of Kingston, which was largely attended by the doctors of the city, at the close of the meeting Lieut. Col. H. R. Duff, principal medical officer of the third division, intimated that the department was extremely anxious to have a senior surgeon for overseas service, a man of experience, one who might be placed in charge of a base hospital. Dr. Duff intimated that there are many young medical men who were willing to go, but it was deemed very advisable that a man of experience and wisdom should be with the force. Dr. W. G. Anglin was so impressed with the remarks of Col. Duff that he has volunteered his services. If his application is accepted, and there seems little doubt but

that it will, the Canadian force will have with it a most capable surgeon, a man of tried worth, and of wide knowledge in surgical cases. Dr. Anglin has spent years in Queen's Medical College, is a senior officer at the Kingston General Hospital, and has all the qualifications of temperament and companionship to make him a splendid head to any medical corps to which he may be attached. He is a registered surgeon of Britain and also of the United States.

Dr. Anglin sacrifices much in making the offer, but he feels impressed that he may be needed at the front, and he believes that, as a true Canadian, he must do whatever he can to aid the empire in its hour of need. It is not likely that he will be called to the front before the second contingent goes, which will be in January next.

Kingstonians, we are assured, will be delighted at the splendid offer Dr. Anglin has made on behalf of his country.

IN MARINE CIRCLES.

Movements of Vessels Reported Along the Harbor.

Quite a heavy gale has been raging on the lake all the week and as a result vessels have been delayed on their trips.

TO CONDUCT Y.M.C.A. WORK.

Among the Third Division Overseas Volunteers in Kingston.

It has been definitely decided that the national committee of the Y. M. C. A. will conduct work among the overseas volunteers of the third division, who will assemble in Kingston, commencing on Monday, November 2nd. F. S. Shephard, of the National Committee, has been in communication with F. J. Wilson, acting general secretary, with reference to the work.

On Thursday Mr. Wilson was in conversation with Col. J. D. R. Hemming, the commanding officer, who is very favorable to the scheme. It is altogether likely that the militia department will secure a large auditorium in the city where the work can be carried on. The work will be similar to what has been taking place at the military camps.
