Belgian Relief Fund.

At the present time there are nine bags of potatoes and three bags of oats awaiting shipment. Citizens desiring to send produce to the Belgians can have the same for sent to the Ontario street fire station, or if notified the firemen will call for them. They would like to get all the produce in for one shipment. The firemen are in need of barrels, bags and cases to make the shipments. The local branch of the Bank of Toronto has offered to forward the money for the relief of the Belgians.

It Was Pretty Strong Cider
There was an interesting case before Justices of the Peace Bradshaw and Spooner, on Saturday morning. The case was brought by the crown against a resident of the township of Portland for selling liquor in a local option township. The barrel of liquid in question was brought into court. The Belleville cider works sold the defendant the liquid, guaranteeing it 1.50 per cent. proof. It was found by government analysis to be 3.38 per cent. The law is that anything above 2.30 per cent. is intoxicating.

At the Police Court
There was but a short session of the police court on Saturday morning. A young man volunteered for overseas service on Friday morning, celebrated event later on in the day and at night was very much under the weather with the result that he was placed under arrest by Constable Michael Berrigan. He pleaded guilty to being drunk when arraigned before the court, and has magistrate handed him over to the military authorities.

'Varsity and Queen's Played Here Saturday Morning.

On Saturday morning the 'Varsity soccer team, of Toronto, clashed with Queen's in the final game for the championship of the intercollegiate soccer union, comprised of these two teams. Last year a stiff fight was put up by Queen's and 'Varsity for the trophy and was won by the latter after three games had been played. Queen's went to Toronto and clashed with 'Varsity, concluding the game with a drawn score. A week later 'Varsity came to Kingston and again the score ended even. 'Varsity then paid Queen's travelling expenses to Toronto, where the final match was settled by 'Varsity winning the round.

So far this season the result of the playing has been always the same. Queen's two weeks ago went to Toronto and after an hour and a half contest the teams finished with a scoreless game.

The first half resulted in 'Varsity's favor by a score of 1 to 0, McCorkindale scoring a goal after fifteen minutes' play.

There was no scoring in the second half, the game ending 'Varsity, 1; Queen's, 0. This gives 'Varsity the championship.
