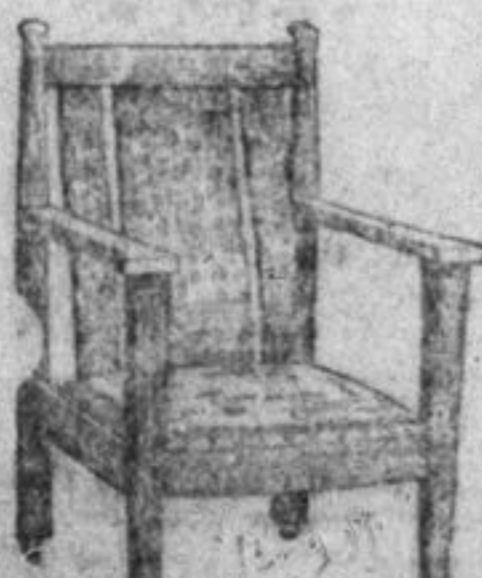

LOST EYE IN BATTLE

Rev. W. F. Fitzgerald's Nephew Led a Bayonet Charge.

Rev. W. F. Fitzgerald received very sad news on Monday morning from Ireland. A letter told him of a wound his nephew, Lieut. Gerald V. Fitzgerald, received in battle, which resulted in the loss of his eye. Lieut. Fitzgerald was with the Leinster regiment, which went through three days of hard fighting. In leading a bayonet charge near Chappelle, on the Belgian frontier, he was hit by a German rifle bullet close to the left eye. No operation could be performed on the field, so the young man, who is only twenty years of age, was removed with the wounded back to England, and taken to Wimbledon Cottage hospital, where it was found necessary to remove the eye. The optic nerve of the other eye is affected. Lieut. Fitzgerald's father is manager of the Bank of Ireland in Waterford.
