A CHANGE IN ORDERS THE TRAINING CORPS

WITH REGARD TO THE NEW PLAN TO INSTRUCT CANADIAN OFFICERS URGED. BATTALIONS ORGANIZED — THE SUGGESTION FAVORABLY RECEIVED BY MILITIA COUNCIL.

Ottawa, Nov. 2.—A delegation from the Canadian universities waited on the militia council, on Saturday, and expressed the desire of the institutions they represented to cooperate in activities consequent upon the present war situation. The delegation took up more particularly the matter of the formation of a Canadian officers' training corps at the universities, and discussed this matter at length with the militia authorities. It was composed of Principal Peterson, of McGill university and Prof. Eve, Dr. Todd and Capt. McGee, also representing that institution; Col. Lamb, Col. Fatherly, and Major MacFarlane, representing Toronto university, and Dean Cappon, from Queen's Kingston.

The suggestion in connection with the establishment of officers' training corps at the universities, pointed out that the interest taken in the formation of provisional battalions at these institutions had been keen. In Toronto university, 1,400 had been enrolled in these corps; in McGill university and Macdonald college, 300; and in Queen's, 270, with 150 students in an engineering corps. The suggestion was made that this training should be utilized for the formation of regular officers' training corps at the universities. The method proposed was that student battalions, after drilling during the winter at the colleges, could receive six weeks' further training at concentration camps in the spring, and would then be ready for service in the present war. This would enable students to finish their year, and would enable the establishment of a university battalion in the spring to go as a separate unit to the front. It is thought that the Canadian universities could in this way raise two thousand or more.

The suggestion was favorably received by the militia council, and consideration was promised. In the afternoon Dr. Peterson had a further interview with Major-general Gwatkin, when the scheme was further discussed. There is little doubt that it will lead to the enlistment of a large number of students in Canada, though whether they will form part of various corps or go as a distinct unit will have to be determined.

Attached To R.C.H.A. Cadets Cook, Cassells and Macaulay were on Saturday attached as lieutenants to the R.C.H.A. and will leave for the front as soon as a vacancy appears. Cadet Duff-Stewart is attached to the Royal Canadian Dragoons in Toronto and will leave to fill the first vacancy in the capacity of lieutenant. The other sixteen graduating cadets have left for England to accept any vacancy that might occur.

AN OLD RESIDENT DEAD. Mrs. Thomas Hurst Passed Away at Noon on Sunday.

Fortified by the right of holy mother church, there passed to her eternal reward, Sunday, shortly past noon, Mrs. (Capt.) Thomas Hurst, (nee Elizabeth Murphy), a venerable lady who was widely known and highly esteemed by a wide circle of friends.

Mrs. Hurst was born in County Meath, Ireland, and came to this country with her parents when but a child, and her whole life was spent in this city, which she loved so deeply.

She was of a very sunny disposition and always looked upon her bright side of life. For the past year she had been in failing health, but her sudden calling away has cast a gloom over the entire city. She was a devout Catholic and an active member of the league of the Sacred Heart. The funeral will be held from the home of her son-in-law, Patrick Derry, 185 Collingwood street, Wednesday morning at nine o'clock, when a solemn requiem mass will be sung for the repose of her soul, after which the remains will be interred in St. Mary's cemetery.
