KINGSTON MOST PATRIOTIC EXAMPLE TO ALL.

Every Family Seems to Have Some at the Front or Going With Next Contingent. — Retail Shops Appear to be Busy.

For a place of his size Kingston probably has at the present time more soldiers drilling and preparing for active service than any other city in Canada.

The streets are full of men in uniform, and everywhere the people are talking of war. The impression of a recent visitor to the Limestone City, was that everyone had some relation or friend already at the front or going with the next contingent. On the street cars one continually hears: "Have you heard from so and so?" "Not but I expect to see him shortly as I am going of the front with the next contingent."

In many families there are brothers who are at the front in different contingents, that is to say if there were three brothers, one went with the first contingent, another is going with the second and another with the third.

The fact that Kingston has been the centre of the training for officers and cadets has always made the town a most military one. As well as the infantry regiments which have been recruiting for overseas service, the Royal Canadian Horse Artillery is getting its full complement of men, although it is not thought that these will be sent to the front yet. The university of Toronto played Queen's on Saturday in a very exciting football game but the remarkable part about the match was that both before the match and afterwards, as well as during the time between periods the subject of conversation was going to the front. The subject was sagely thrashed out by the visiting collegians in the corridors of the Frontenac Hotel, where the Varsity boys put up, and most of the football players talked of donning a more serious uniform, as soon as their college studies were over in the spring.

The usual activities amongst the cadets of the Royal Military College in Kingston are entirely absent this year. Many of the cadets have already gone to the front, and the remaining are too busy studying to get their commissions to bother much about football and other similar games.

Many have already gone to the front, and there is not one who is now studying who does not expect to see active service before the war is over.

The people in Kingston seem to have plenty of money or may be it is because they are very patriotic.

The retail shops were crowded on Saturday afternoon with busy shoppers, and one would hardly believe that hard times' stories had reached the city.

Another fact that would strike the visitor to Kingston would be the comparative scarcity of out-of-works and tramps. Although statistics of the Kingston police department might point out that there are more unemployed in the city than usual, certainly they are not much in evidence. A healthy looking man begging for a meal or a night's lodging would meet with little sympathy and probably be told by the first patriotic citizen he met to go to the first recruiting office and enlist, and he would get food, clothing and a place in which to sleep.

It is not even necessary for a man who wants to join the army to enlist for overseas service as the Royal Canadian Horse Artillery are even now calling for recruits to sign on for three years' service in the Canadian Permanent Force.

FOR ROYAL COMMISSION.

Mass of Information Being Forwarded to London.

Ottawa, Nov. 5.—The trade and commerce department has collected a mass of statistical information on Canada's neutral resources, industries and commerce, and is forwarding it to the Dominion's Royal commission in London. Although the sittings of the commission in Canada abruptly on the outbreak of the war, the work of investigation has not stopped and a good deal of evidence which was prepared for presentation at the commission's sittings has been forwarded to the subjects, etc., is being forwarded to England.

KAISER'S LATEST ORDER

"Skin the Fellows Wherever You Meet Them."

Rotterdam, Nov. 5.—One of the latest orders of the kaiser is indicative alike of his anger and disappointment at the holding back of his armies. According to the Vossische Zeitung, the kaiser recently visited Berlin, and in the north of France, "When he got out of his car," writes one of the soldiers, "he greeted everybody with the words, 'Good day, comrades,' and we cheered in reply. Then he gave a short address, praising us for our bravery, and finished up with the words, 'Skin the fellows wherever you meet them.' Then we quickly cheered again and the great moment was passed."

SEE CANADIAN NOVELTY.

Englishmen Get Acquainted With That Entrenching Tool.

Basingstoke, Eng., Nov. 5.—Canadian troops arriving at Salisbury Plain carry an entrenching tool that is novel to the Englishman. It is capable of being used as a shield and is slung across the shoulder in a leather case. The tool is a spade weighing about four pounds, and consequently can be carried at all times. The spade has an oval hole in the centre of it through which a gun barrel can be thrust. The tool thus serves both as a rifle rest and a shield to the soldier in the trenches.

All the spades have been subjected to heavy fire and the metal in them is practically bullet-proof. At a distance of 200 yards, heavy ammunition only cracks the shields and does not penetrate them.

EMBARGO IS ENLARGED.

Foot and Mouth Disease Found Now in Illinois and Pennsylvania.

Ottawa, Nov. 4.—The embargo against the importation of cattle, fodder, straw, etc., from Michigan and Indiana, on account of the outbreak of foot and mouth disease in these two states last month, has been enlarged to include the states of Illinois and Pennsylvania, the disease having spread to certain localities in these states.

A Pittsburg Presentation.

Stops Exportation of Rice.

Rome, Nov. 5.—One hundred car loads of rice shipped to Germany via Switzerland, were stopped to-day on the frontier at Chiasso. The government does not allow the exportation of foodstuffs to belligerents since, owing to the extensive smuggling, rice and potatoes are being sent to Germany, where they are used as substitutes for bread.
