

MEN ARE RETURNING TO FORMER ENLISTMENT IN THE ARTILLERY

At Tete de Pont Barracks — Twelve Officers Already Apply for Course in Royal School of Artillery.

Fifty-two of the men that transferred from the R.C.A. to the 21st battalion on Saturday last, are transferring back, Friday afternoon, to the new battery that is being formed. There has been continual intimations that the officers that enlisted the men for the Tete de Pont recruiting depot in outside places misrepresented the conditions to the men. This is not so, as the officers say they enlisted the men with the understanding that they would be drilled in artillery work and when vacancies occurred in the R.C.A., now in Europe, the men from here would be sent to take their places. The order for a reduction in the pay and the suggestion that it would be the middle of next year before they would be sent over did not come until a week after the men were here. There are 150 recruits in the barracks when the officers came out. Twenty of them went home and since then two of the recruits have returned. Others are making arrangements to return to re-enlist in the new battery. Fifty-three of the recruits remained on the force and the remainder transferred to the infantry in the hope that they would be able to go overseas sooner. Now fifty-two of the men are returning to the artillery, as they have a good chance as the infantry to go overseas in the spring.

Capt. C. P. Fee, 21st battery, of Peterboro, reported for duty on Friday. He will be attached to the R.C.A. here. He was attached at one time to "A" battery.

Many other experienced officers are coming to the new battery and it is expected that recruits and horses will be coming immediately.

Twelve officers have already made application for instruction in the Royal School of Artillery that will open on Monday in Tete de Pont barracks.

Orders were received from Ottawa that the number of Canadian Engineers from Kingston who will go overseas will be eighty men and three officers. The officers have not yet been chosen although several have volunteered.

The signalling division of the 21st battalion was started on Friday morning by Lieut. A. Strong with twelve men. Most of the men have had more or less experience. Twenty-six men make up the signalling squad.

Lieut.-Col. R. M. Rathbun, O.C., of 9th brigade, C.F.A., was in the city on business on Friday.

Major W. R. Reardon has been transferred from the 9th brigade and will command the new battery to be formed in Tete de Pont barracks.

The Army Service corps will take overseas 260 men and twenty-six officers. Major W. A. Mitchell is the commanding officer of No. 3 company.

Sgt.-Sergt. W. Perrin, of the 5th field battery, has been transferred to the R.C.A.

Lectures for the officers and N.C.O.'s will be commenced on Monday. Major C. C. Bennett will give the first lecture at the armouries.

Sgt.-Sergt. Logan has been appointed Q.M. S. of the left half of the battalion, white employed at the Cereal works stores.

Sgt. W. T. Fraser has been appointed as sergt.-bugler.

TRIED TO GET A DRINK, But Bartender Recognized Them as On the List.

Two members of the "prohibited list" were very dry on Thursday night and they boldly walked into the Collender hotel on King street, thinking they could put one over the bartender, but they were mistaken. The bartender recognized the two, refused to serve the drinks, and besides called up the inspector, C. W. Wright, with the result that a charge has been laid against the offenders and they will appear in the police court on Monday or Tuesday.

One of the men wears glasses and in his attempt to trick the bartender on this occasion he did not wear the glasses. The bartender's eyes were good and thus the two were "held up" at the bar.

Horse Smashed Store Window. The clerk in the store of McIntosh Brothers, corner of Princess and Wellington streets, received a right on Friday morning when the horse attached to one of Van Loven's delivery wagons crashed through the large plate glass window. The animal was running away and dashed along Wellington street. In making the turn into Princess, the horse could not turn fast enough, but, instead, ran directly into the window. The animal was stopped by the collision.

VETERAN OF THE CRIMEAN.

"Duke" McCambridge Celebrating His 88th Birthday.

One of Kingston's war veterans, "Duke" McCambridge, known to nearly every Kingstonian, for he has lived here many years, on Friday celebrated his eighty-eighth birthday, and received the congratulations of his host of friends.

For some time "Duke" has been suffering from rheumatism, and this has made it very difficult for him to get around, but Friday was his birthday he simply had to make the rounds.

Mr. McCambridge was born in England, and is a veteran of the Crimean war, the Turkish war, and also served in the Fenian raids and the North-West rebellion. At the time of the Crimean war he was nursed by Florence Nightingale. He did duty in the trenches and can tell many a vivid story of the encounters.

He moved to this country after the Crimean war and took up his residence in Kingston and has lived here ever since. He served with the 47th Regiment at Barriefield camp for many years. In fact a camp without "Duke" was not a very unusual thing.

Kingston's veteran and his wife reside on Wellington street. He has two sons, one in Kingston and the other in Detroit.

Should Pray And Not Faint.

Rev. T. W. Savary presided at the noon-day prayer meeting in the city hall on Friday. There was a very good attendance. Rev. Alfred Brown gave the usual ten-minute address.
