TO FURTHER RECRUIT

IN KINGSTON FOR HEAVY FIELD BATTERY.

Special Service in the Armouries on Sunday Afternoon For the 21st Battalion - Bishop Bidwell to officiate.

Still some more men will be recruited in Kingston. The order came on Saturday to the O. C. of the division to establish here a portion of a heavy field artillery battery. Portions will be formed in Kingston when the contingent leaves in the spring these will be brought together and a heavy field battery will be sent over. The guns used will be of the 4.7 type. The portion of the battery that will be formed in this division will consist of a lieutenant and thirty-nine men, besides shoemakers, saddlers, etc.

One-half of the 21st battalion will be supplied with uniforms by Saturday. This is an exceptionally good record as the outfitting of the 50th men only commenced this week.

On Sunday, church parades will be held. At 10.30 o'clock a special service is to be held in St. Mary's cathedral for the Roman Catholic members of the battery. At 11 o'clock a special service is to be held in the Armouries by Bishop Bidwell for the Protestant members. The galleries have been reserved for civilians.

Two automobile transports have arrived, and later two cars are expected. These will enable the officers to save much time in going from one place to another.

R. Maddiman, of Ottawa, reported to the O. C. of the battalion on Saturday morning for duty. He is secretary to a minister in Ottawa and speaks eight languages.

On Monday, classes for the instruction of officers and N. C. O.'s will be commenced in connection with the battalion. They will be Royal Military college instructors, R.C.M.A. officers and others. A number of men have applied for entrance to the classes and if successful in the examinations will be promoted to higher positions.

There are ready thirty-eight accepted applications to the course in the Royal School of Artillery, that opens in Lele de Pont barracks on Monday. Eight of these officers are from Montreal, four from London and one from Winnipeg. Eighty officers made application from Toronto, but as the maximum number taking the course will be about a hundred, all of these cannot be accepted.

Notes About The Soldiers.

WOLFE ISLAND FIRE.

Alexander Livingstone Loses Barns and Stables.

A bad fire broke out on the farm of Alexander Livingstone on Wolfe Island about 3.30 o'clock Saturday morning and before it was checked several of the barns, cattle stables, hay and implements were all destroyed. The horses and cattle were gotten out after much difficulty. Mr. Livingstone attributes the fire to hunters sleeping in the hay. The fire started in the morning. He was awakened from his sleep by the crackling of the flames and at once hurried down stairs to release the animals from the burning buildings. The granary was saved after great difficulty by the splendid work of the villagers who formed a bucket brigade. The loss will be partly covered by insurance.
