Less Than Seven Per Cent Rejected -The Physique of the Volunteers For Overseas Service is Good.

The physique of the men of the 21st battalion is exceptionally good, and although they are all rigidly examined by competent physicians, very few are rejected. It has been estimated that less than seven per cent. of the men already examined have been rejected. The principal cause of rejection are ruptures, varicose veins, foot-arches and bad teeth. If more than five teeth are missing or the set is in poor condition, the applicant must be refused. In connection with the medical examination, there is a number of Inuians in the battalion who are probably the best men, physically. The

eye-test is very strick but these men rate very high in this examination. Over four hundred men have already been examined by the officers in charge of the work in the last two days and a half.
