

FIRST AID CLASSES

ARE ADVOCATED FOR OVERSEA VOLUNTEERS HERE.

St. John's Ambulance Association to Arrange For Them—Annual Meeting of the Association on Friday Evening.

A meeting was held on Friday evening in the biology building of Queen's university for the purpose of making arrangements to have the St. John's Ambulance association more fully organized for the winter. Last year many persons availed themselves of the opportunity afforded them by the instructional organization and were rewarded by instructive lessons of first aid to the wounded. At that time it was not dreamed that before another year elapsed would there be a call for nurses and assistants to go to the front where one of the greatest wars in the history of the world is being waged. Before this year is up, asserted Lieut.-Col. H. R. Duff, who acted as chairman, the demand no doubt will be great for such, and some of those who were benefited last year by the instructional courses may have the privilege of journeying to Europe. It would be wise, said Col. Duff, if as many as possible would come forward and take first aid lessons. The war is not going to be a short one, and probably many additional ambulance helpers will be required. Dr. F. Etherington and Dr. G. E. Kidd, who were also present, thought the classes should be better attended and it was also the opinion of the three doctors that instructional classes should be given to each half



She Died at Bath After Stricken With Paralysis. On Oct. 21st, Mrs. Mary M. Peterson, one of Bath's oldest and most respected inhabitants, passed, suddenly, to her reward, being the victim of a stroke of apoplexy. Deceased was born in the year 1832 and was the daughter of William Howard, an early Loyalist settler of Amherst Island, and a niece of Col. Hitches, also a pioneer of that place. In 1867 she was united in marriage to Howard, a prominent merchant and grain dealer of Bath, and from this union two children were born, Ida May, and Fred W., the latter a wholesale merchant of Los Angeles, Cal., who with a grandson, the Rev. Howard Kennedy, of Calgary, Alta., survive to mourn the loss. In 1887 she met the crowning sorrow of her life in the death of her husband, and ten years later married Hazel Peterson, years later married Hazel Peterson, to the tomb by six years. In the death of Mrs. Peterson, Bath has lost an angel of mercy and a sister of charity. Her hand was ever ready to help the needy, her mind ever alert to relieve the sufferer, her house a home, and herself a mother to all who came under her roof. Few are better prepared to meet the call: "In as much as ye have done it unto the least of these, ye have done it unto me." 
