London, Nov. 7 .- The contention of the British and foreign offices that Turkey was forced into the war by German intrigue and against the wishes of the responsible government is borne out by information received in Odessa from Constantinople, which describes a fraud practised on the government at Constantinople by the German officers

of the battle cruiser Goeben. The Goeben had been sent into the Black Sea with other Turkish warships as a precautionary measure. After the Goeben attacked Russian sea coast towns and ships, her ofacers sent a wireless message to Constantinople, which asserted that the Eussians had made a treacherous attack on Turkish ships, and that the Turkish fleet had been for-

On Friday evening the grand vizier, alarmed over the turn affairs were taking, summoned another council, and placed before it the request of the triple entente powers that Turkey remove German officers and seamen from Turkish ships and repatriate these persons. He suggested also that compensation be offered. The last-minute proposal was rejected, and the grand vizier resigned. A despatch to the Times says that some members of the Turkish government were ignorant the fleet's attack on the Black sea ports two hours after foreigners in Constantinopole were aware of it.
