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

**AID FOR THE NEEDY**

REPORT MADE TO CITY COUNCIL BY MAYOR SHAW.

Probably \$10,000 Will Be Necessary—The Question of Raising the Money Referred to Finance Committee.  
Mayor Shaw presented this statement to the City Council on Monday evening.  
"Thanks to the favorable climatic conditions this autumn it has been possible to provide work on the streets and in the works department for many who otherwise would have been idle, but I believe I discharge my duty when I draw your attention to the fact that the near approach of winter makes it necessary for us to direct our attention and that of the citizens at large to the conditions that must soon prevail.  
"As you are aware, Kingston did not feel the full impulse of industrial prosperity that prevailed throughout Canada to the same extent as other places, and we are therefore in a better way than most cities to withstand the strain of the present industrial depression due to worldwide conditions arising through the war. It is not, however, to be forgotten that we have always the poor with us, and while this winter provision must be made for those who will be—as they have been—a charge upon us, we must anticipate greater demands from many who have suddenly, and without any fault on their part, found themselves unable to earn what was necessary for the support of themselves and their families.  
"Kingston is proverbially generous and benevolent and charitable institutions are numerous and adequately maintained, and the prompt response recently given to the request for contributions to the patriotic fund for the maintenance and assistance of the wives and dependents of the men who have gone to the front convinces me that the unusual burdens that must be borne this winter will be easily carried.  
"The duty of citizenship requires that those who have shall now give for the help of their less fortunate fellow-citizens. A committee of the citizens composed of representatives of the City Council, the Board of Trade, the Trades and Labor Council and benevolent and charitable organizations of the city has now under advisement a method to be adopted for the distribution of benevolence during the coming winter, and that this may be adequately done it is necessary that a substantial amount—say \$10,000—should be raised and be at the disposal of those in charge.  
"In bringing this matter to your attention, I feel sure that I will have your hearty co-operation and assistance in devising ways and means to secure the necessary funds to carry on in Kingston the charitable and benevolent work of the coming winter."  
Ald. Nickle moved that the aldermen should canvass their wards for subscriptions for poor relief, and hand over the same to the city aid committee.  
There was some discussion upon this resolution, which was eventually withdrawn, on the suggestion of Aids Couper and Graham, and the question was referred to the Finance Committee for report.  
This evening there is a meeting of the city aid committee, and it was thought that this committee should make a definite report upon the need of financial assistance for the poor, and as to how the money should be collected.

GERMAN CRUISER EMDEN JUST DESTROYED.

**CHASED DOWN THE WILY GERMAN CRUISER EMDEN**

London, Nov. 10.—The German cruiser Emden, one of the terrors of the British shipping in the Pacific, has been destroyed by the warship Sydney. The admiralty announced, to-day, that the Emden had been driven ashore on Cocos Island and burned to the water's edge. The Sydney which finally ran down the Emden after a chase, which has lasted for several days, is a part of the Australian navy. It is presumed that it was the Sydney which located the Emden only a few days ago and sank one of her store-ships and captured another. The fleet German vessel escaped, however, showing a clean pair of heels to the British vessels.  
The Emden's most notable feat was her raid into Penang Harbor where she sank a Russian cruiser and a French destroyer.  
The Admiralty announced, to-day, that the British warship Chatham has chased the German protected cruiser Konigsberg into port in Rufisque Harbor, off German East Africa. The admiralty said the Konigsberg probably had been driven aground.  
Since the opening of the war, the German cruiser Emden has sunk or captured twenty-three vessels, including several merchant ships. Most of the merchantmen she accounted for were carrying British flags. The admiralty adds it is thought many of the officers and men of the Emden lost their lives in the action with H.M.S. Sydney.

**HOLDING LINES FAST**

A SUPREME EFFORT IS BEING MADE TO CRUSH ALLEES.  
But The British and French Forces Are Holding Fast—Ypres is in Flames—Roar of Big Guns incessant.  
Paris, Nov. 10.—The allied lines, to-day, are holding solidly against the fierce continuous attack of the Germans in the vicinity of Ypres.  
At the war office it is declared the enemy is bringing tremendous pressure to bear on what would seem to be the supreme effort to crush the allied defense.  
Ypres is totally destroyed by flames. The roar of the big guns is incessant as the Germans keep up a constant artillery fire under cover of which the infantry assaults are made upon the British and French trenches.

6.—Comets influence our solar system, and in the case of former ones these followed warmer weather proportionately with increased mists and showers. So we in passing through this life exert an influence throughout. A wicked man facing death exclaimed, "Oh, gather up my influence and bury it with me!" That could not be done, as it entered into the lives of others, and projects onwards.  
7.—The comet moves harmoniously with the Creator's plans, and is obedient to the laws of its environment. And we may live beautiful lives in doing His will, and build those lives into the Kingdom of God that will not pass away. Such harmony brings lasting peace.  
8.—The comet gives us a hint of the vastness of the universe. It passed on (to us living at this point) by Mars, Jupiter, Saturn, and Uranus, and does not cease. When discovered it was computed to be three hundred and seventy millions of miles distant from the sun and time and point of appearing were stated ten months before it came. That it was when so far away is proof of great size and brilliancy. If one travelled with the velocity of light for ages he would not come to some bountiful wall, as a full end of the stellar system, for space is infinite. And the Great Architect of the Universe's doubtless richer in suns and their planets than any chieftain is in grains of earth and sand. And it is a pity for Him to care for prayerful, trustful children. And the "bought of it all should lift us up out of littleness and doubt, and lead us to say with the Seer of old, "The works of the Lord are wonderful, sought out of all them that have pleasure therein."
