Chinchilla Coney, one inch wide, 65 cents per yard.

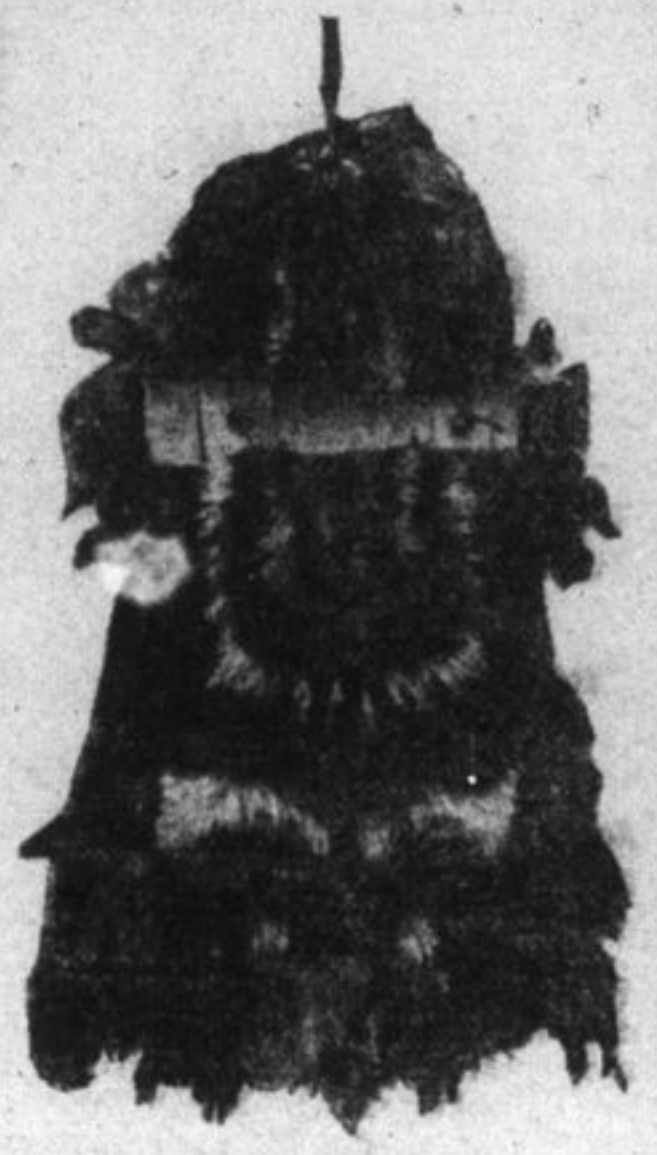
Black Martin, good imitation of Alaska Sable, one-half inch wide, 65 cents per yard; one inch wide, \$1.20 per yard.

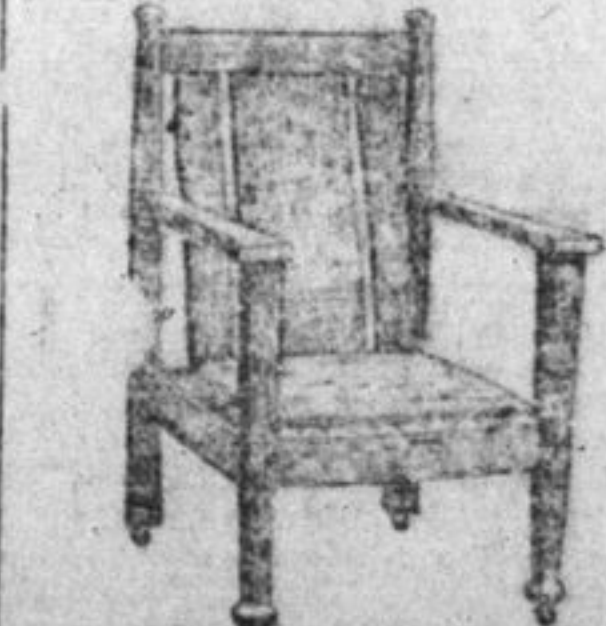

## SANITARY INSPECTOR

### MAKES HIS REPORT TO BOARD OF HEALTH.

Constable Timmerman Tells of the Work He Has Done — He Was Kept Pretty Busy.

The following report has been made to the Board of Health by Sanitary Inspector Nicholas Timmerman.

Since my last report of June 11th I have visited 525 houses which the assistant sanitary inspectors have reported as having dirty yards, cellars, privy vaults, etc., and I found the majority had not been cleaned. I have given a short notice to clean up immediately, and found when I re-inspected those places they were all cleaned up.

I also have notified by giving a proper notice 52 owners of 30 houses to put in the sinks in those houses now when there are drains in the streets where those houses adjoin. Some of these people have put in the sinks after receiving notice, but the majority have asked me for an extension of time owing to the scarcity of money and out of work, but have promised as soon as the times brighten up a little they will put the sinks in.

I have from time to time visited the butcher shops, ice cream parlors, fruit stores and Chinese restaurants, and kept a close watch on them to see that they were kept clean.

I also have received since my last report 96 special complaints of a different nature such as blocked drains, broken drain pipes, and traps, blocked closets and sinks, no trap under the sinks, tin pipes leading from the sinks to the drains, etc., also complaints of hens kept too near neighbors houses, dirty stables, too much manure kept in yards and no manure boxes. Some of these complaints were very sanitary and dangerous to health; those complaints I have seen to that they were immediately repaired and made sanitary and booked in the inspector's report book.

Outside of those complaints there were a great number of minor complaints which I have in the meantime attended to.

There were some sanitary closets put in houses outside the sanitary limit this summer; in cases where new houses are erected and the privy vault of the adjoining house too near and had become a nuisance on a detriment to the new valuable property, I gave notice to have those closets removed and a sanitary closets put in the houses.

I received a complaint through the chief of police about the unsanitary condition of the old Gore street school and a nuisance in that street. I have given notice to the authorities of Queen's college to nail and clean up the old school as it was a public nuisance, and with the assistance of the property holders in that locality we succeeded in having the school taken down.

I have taken forty-seven samples of milk from different peddlers to test the cleanliness of the milk and give the samples and name of each peddler to Dr. Williamson, medical health officer.

I had one case before the police court where Harry Webster, 311 Princess street, rendered tallow without first obtaining permission from the Board of Health, and he was fined \$5 and costs.

### LIVELY SNOW STORM.

Kingston Had a Taste of Winter on Tuesday Night.

Kingston had a taste of winter weather on Tuesday night when the weather man kept his word given earlier in the day for a snow storm. And it was a lively one while it lasted. Citizens are now looking for some more mild weather, but the weather man stated this morning that there would be more snow and rain, followed by colder weather on Thursday.

### Our Work Not Ended.

Rev. Dr. Jordan preaching on Sunday in Toronto, said regarding the war:

God has given us our work to do, and we do not believe it is finished yet."

### Division Court Appeal Cases.

There were two interesting cases before Judge Madden in the Division court on Tuesday. In the case of Whitty vs. Thomas, the first judgment, of which a appeal was applied for, judgment was reserved. The defendant is an actor whose sketch was refused by the plaintiff, manager of the Orpheum theatre.

The appeal against a judgment in the case of Bell vs. Leo was allowed with costs. This is a case of assault over the payment of some wages. The former judgment was a fine of five dollars and costs or thirty days.

### Remains To Be Buried.

The remains of the Italian, Michele Minghella, who was killed on the G.T. tracks Saturday afternoon, will be buried in St. Mary's cemetery on Thursday morning. S. S. Corbett got into communication with some friends of the deceased, and the remains have been ordered to be decently buried. They will be taken to St. Mary's cathedral on Thursday morning, where a solemn requiem mass will be sung by Rev. Father A. J. Hanley.

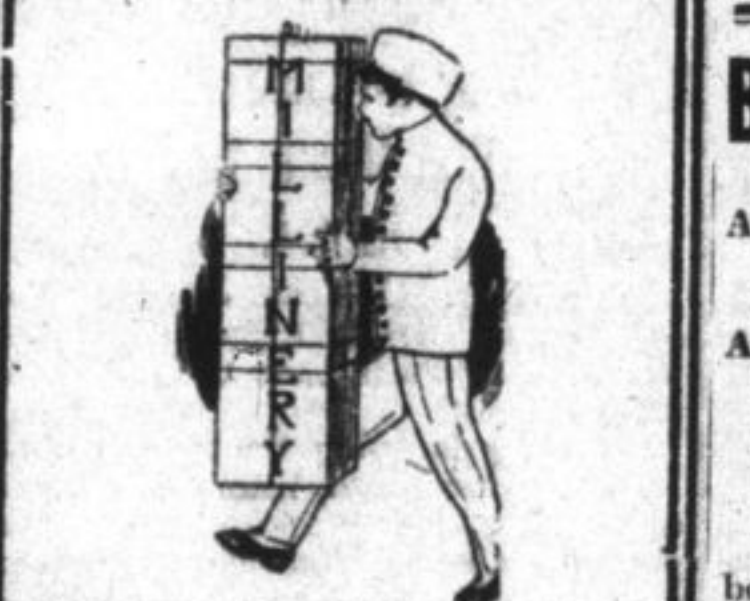
### Inspected Schools.

## BELGIANS NOT COMING

### ALL FIGHTING MEN WANTED IN THEIR COUNTRY.

Arrangements Had Been Made for a Number to Locate in Kingston District—Many Applications Made For Help.

It now looks as if the Belgians looked to come out to Canada and locate in the Kingston district will not make the trip.

George Hunter, immigration agent, who had been making local arrangements, has been notified that all the Belgians in England who are able to take their place on the firing line, have been summoned back to Belgium, and it is also the wish that the women and the children get back to the country as soon as they are able to do so. Apart from this a change made in the plans may be the means of keeping the Belgians away.

It is stated that a demand is being made that the party hiring the Belgians pay half their passage out to this country. This was not asked in the first arrangement made, and Mr. Hunter has written the authorities in the old country that he would not be able to make such a guarantee as this. As the Belgians will be unable to speak English and it will take some time for them to pick up the language and be of service on the farm, it would be too much to ask that the farmers hiring them help pay for their passage. However, different arrangements may be made, but this is the way matters now stand.

Mr. Hunter has received over sixty applications for Belgian help. When the announcement was first made that they were coming out he received many applications from people who were willing to keep the children and help the mothers and fathers make a living.
