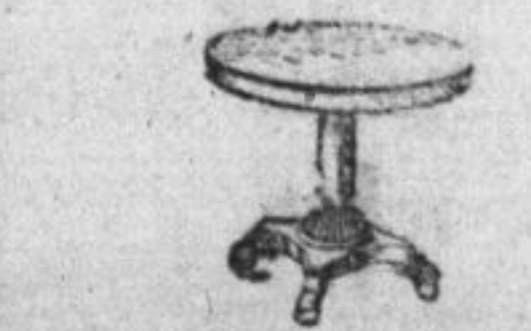

## DEMANDED BREAKFAST THE MOWAT HOSPITAL

In broad daylight, a German walked into a home on Brock street, between Division street and University avenue, on Saturday morning last, and demanded that the good lady of the house provide him with his breakfast. He is stated to not even knock at the door, but walked right in and told the woman that he wanted his breakfast. The man was fairly well dressed, and stated that he arrived in Kingston from Montreal on a freight train and that he intended to catch a freight train and go on through to Toronto. The lady was good enough to give him his breakfast. He made many boasts as to what Germany would do to England before the war was over, and the two had somewhat of a heated argument. The woman upheld Great Britain in all her actions and told the German that his country would certainly be downed, and that it was merely a matter of time.

"Don't you be too sure of that," replied the stranger. "You will see that Germany pulls through this war with a grand victory."  
After finishing his breakfast the man made off and was never seen again in the neighborhood. The woman would have liked to notify the police or the military authorities, but she was afraid that the man would hear of it and should she give an alarm. Had the military authorities been notified there would have been another prisoner of war in Fort Henry.

The funds for these were supplied by bequest from the late Mrs. Nicol, one of the cottages to be known as David Nicol cottage and the other as the Sarah Nicol cottage. It is expected these will be ready for occupation by the end of the year.

Reports were received from R. J. McKelvey, visiting governor for the month, and from the Daughters of the Empire. The reports were all satisfactory. There are seventeen patients in residence. Many donations were received during the month from farmers in the adjoining townships, and these are very much appreciated.
