FEEDING THE SOLDIERS

THE AMOUNT OF PROVISIONS REQUIRED IS VERY LARGE.

Officers' and Civilians' Classes At the Armouries — all the Members of 21st Battalion Inoculated Against Typhoid.

The Army Service stores in Tets de Post barracks look like a wholesale grocer's warehouse these days. There the provision supply department is located to feed the soldiers of the 21st battalion.

The supplies are taken in the new motor-trucks to the half-battalion headquarters at Artillery Park barracks and the Cereal Works.

The men have all been completely supplied with two double pairs of heavy grey, army blankets each. The blankets are kept in the south-end of the armouries in bale containing ten pairs.

The men in the signalling section are now being trained in flag signalling and will later be taught the use of lights and other instruments.

The officers and civilian classes were held at the armouries on Wednesday night. About fifteen officers and twenty-five civilians are taking the course.

The military Y.M.C.A. in Ontario hall has been put into shape and is ready for use.

WAR BULLETINS.

Paris official statement says the front maintained on the left with slight advance of the allies north of Nicourt. British hold against attacks. German detachment routed at Coincourt.

Following the Emden's destruction, the opinion is rising in London that the British naval strength in the Pacific was not adequate at the outset of the war.

All reports from the battle-front report successes over Austrian troops by Servians at every point. Germans continue rushing reinforcements to hold the Thorn-Posen line against the every point.

The British gun-boat Niger was torpedoed by a submarine in the Straits of Dover; all hands saved. The British and French lost terribly in the defense of Dixmude, but were compelled to evacuate it.

A large detachment of Japanese artillery has been sent to aid Russia in Poland. At Montevideo, South America, it is stated that the allied cruisers have rounded up the German min. cruiser Karlsruhe in southern waters.

ACTIVITY AT ST. LUKE'S.

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ADMIRAL ACQUITTED.

Portland, Eng., Nov. 12.—Admiral Troubridge, in command of the British Mediterranean fleet at the time of the German cruisers Goeben and Breslau escaped from Messina, was today acquitted by court-martial before which he was tried on charges following the flight of the warships.

In the commons last night the unionists demanded to know why the naval expedition accompanied by Churchill was sent to defend Antwerp, instead of military directed by Kitchener.

Premier Asquith said that owing to the non-success of many of his first plans, it was unlikely the war would last as long as expected.

POPE URGES CHARITY.

Rome, Nov. 12.—Benedict XV has written letters to several of the archbishops and bishops in the belligerent countries exhorting them to urge upon their people the bestowal of charity upon wounded prisoners, irrespective of their nationality or religious views.

In his letter to Cardinal Luçon, archbishop of Rheims, the pope expressed deep sorrow for the disastrous consequences of the war, both from a religious and artistic standpoint.

Bryan Distributes Plough Shares.

Washington, Nov. 12.—Secretary Bryan began the distribution of the plough shares made of old swords which he is to present to all ambassadors and ministers who signed peace treaties with the United States.
