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WILL BE GIVEN TO THE SCHOOL PUPILS.

Department of Education Preparing Memorandum For Teachers—Following Plan of Great Britain in This Matter.

The children in the Kingston public schools will soon be given lessons from the great war. The department of education has taken a leaf from Great Britain's book in the training of the young, and at the present time having a memorandum prepared which will be sent to all the school teachers, suggesting lines upon which the schools can work in providing lessons for the war.

Mr. Hon. J. A. Pense, president of the Board of Education, has written a letter to the Ontario department of education in which he asks the question, "What can we do for our country?" Mr. Pense points out the need of keeping the system of education going. With the schools kept open there is at home the organization in the hour of distress for feeding school children.

Mr. Pense declares that the larger duty is to show the scholars, according to their age and capacity, why Britain's cause is just, and the right of every country to cherish and defend its national liberty. The time of trial is the time of opportunity. The educationists are the trustees of the territory to guard the lines of communication between the present and the future. There are 7,000,000 pupils and students in England.

"It is to them," he writes, "that we shall hand over the national and international policy which emerges from the present struggle—a form of society which we may hope, broader and more firmly based, freed from the secular heritage of racial hatred and military aggression which Europe knows, especially, but assuredly more exacting, demanding of all its members larger facilities, more highly trained aptitudes, a clear realization of the common duty and destiny of men."

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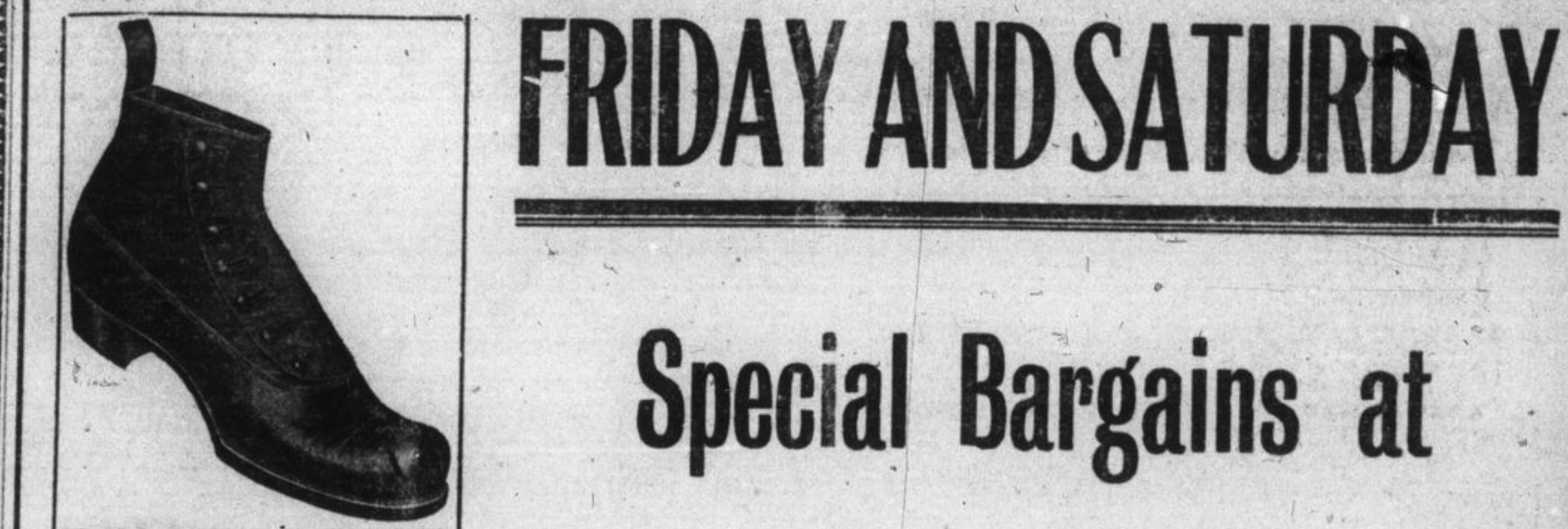
